

BAKER QUINT BEATS KLAMATH FALLS

State Basketball Tourny
Also Sees Myrtle Point
Lose to St. Helens.

SALEM, March 17.—(AP)—The fast-breaking Baker five defeated the Klamath Falls Pelicans last night, 31 to 29, and became the team to beat in the state high school basketball tournament. The Pelicans were pre-tournament favorites.

The Baker squad held the score, 29-29, with four minutes left in the game. Colson and Coleman flipped free throws to win.

University high of Eugene beat Woodburn, 59 to 38, behind the 23-point shooting of Gard, who lacked four points of tying the all-time record set two years ago by Ted Sarpola of Astoria.

McLaughlin of Milford-Freewater weathered an overtime period to down Salem, 25 to 23, after trailing until the last minute of the regular game.

Forward Ernest Lekberg made a field goal and three free throws in the final minute of play to give Sandy a 27-24 victory over Dallas. Dallas was ahead, 23 to 22, when the scoring spree started.

St. Helens, which put Astoria out of the tournament race, beat Myrtle Point, 39 to 19.

Medford walloped Eugene by five points, 39 to 34, in the last game of the night.

In the afternoon session, Chillicothe went into the class B finals by downing the Thurston Panthers, 32 to 28, and Astoria defeated Astoria, 42 to 30.

BAER WANTS LOUIS TO BEAT SCHMELING

SAN LEANDRO, Calif., March 17.—(AP)—Max Baer would like to see Joe Louis defend his heavyweight title, successfully against Max Schmeling next June because "the only way I can redeem myself is by fighting him."

Baer, who returned home yesterday from his Madison Square garden victory over England's Tommy Farr, is scheduled to fight the winner of the Joe Louis-Schmeling bout next September.

"I hope Louis wins," said the former heavyweight champion, whose triumph over Farr put him back in the title line. "I can see now that the only way I can redeem myself is by fighting him. This time I'd win or go out fighting. He'll be carried out or I will."

Max, his left eye still swollen half closed from Farr's punches, said he had changed his boxing style.

"I didn't cut loose with a single Sunday punch against Farr," he exclaimed. "All my blows were short and snappy. That left hook that floored Farr in the first just came out of the sky. I hadn't used it since I fought Schmeling. It surprised me more than it did Tommy."

SENATOR ASPIRANT VISITS ROSEBURG

Carl Donagh Praises F. R.
Leadership, States His
Views on Affairs.

Formation of a local committee to work for the nomination of the May primary election of Carl Donagh, Portland, democratic candidate for United States senator, followed a political meeting last night at the courthouse, where Mr. Donagh was the principal speaker. Dr. L. A. Dillard was elected chairman, Mrs. L. L. Wimberly, vice-chairman, and Mrs. Helene Robinson, secretary.

Praise was given President Roosevelt by Mr. Donagh, prominent Portland attorney, as he spoke on the necessity for preserving law and order, discussed Bonneville power, stabilization of labor conditions, protection of Oregon products, and conservation of wild life.

Introduced by Walter S. Fisher, Mr. Donagh urged extreme action on the part of the United States to preserve a representative form of government.

"Business Security Bettered," "In my opinion President Roosevelt during two administrations has been a stabilizing factor in preserving a representative form of government," the speaker said.

"Continuance of his leadership has brought about a reversal of conditions existing in 1932. Regardless of what critics of the administration may say, business is far more secure and the rights of individual citizens are now more secure than at any previous period in this nation's history."

"The maintenance of our democratic form of government is dependent upon observance and respect for law and order. We must have impartial enforcement of law and continued close cooperation between the federal government and the states in curbing crime and racketeering of any kind."

Discussing labor racketeering, the speaker said: "I say that whether racketeering parades under the banner of an unscrupulous employer or an unscrupulous labor leader, we must be concerned with law and order from the standpoint of protection of the general public."

Transmission Laws Favored. Commending the leadership of President Roosevelt in public power projects, Mr. Donagh declared that Bonneville power offers great promise for the development of Oregon.

He favors, he said, federal construction of transmission lines to points of distribution for resale by municipalities, public utility districts and industrial users. He also urged the Willamette valley project as being of great importance to the state.

Improvement and simplification of the social security program, intelligent administration of relief, continuance of the civilian conservation corps, adequate Columbia river defense and conservation of fish, game and migratory fowls, were among other issues which he supported in his brief talk.

He left this morning to meet with democratic leaders in the Coos Bay district.

MAHONEY DECLARES SENATE CANDIDACY

Action Forced in Advance
of Plans by Linn County
Indictment, He Says.

PORTLAND, March 17.—(AP)—Willis E. Mahoney, accused in a Linn county grand jury indictment of reckless driving, announced his candidacy yesterday for the democratic nomination as United States senator.

The indictment forced him, he said, to make known his candidacy sooner than he had planned. He charged it was "brought about by powerful political influences that have dominated this state for a generation," and sought to "intimidate me with this political indictment."

The indictment accused Mahoney of reckless driving on November 28, 1937, but did not mention a fatal accident in which his automobile was involved on that date. Mahoney said it was returned "on the eve of the close of filing and the primary election."

"I was completely exonerated on the scene and by subsequent investigation by the state police and the only two witnesses," Mahoney declared.

"It is interesting to note another unusual phase of this situation. This indictment was the first of its kind ever returned in Linn county."

"I demand an immediate trial, with complete confidence that this cowardly attack will be brushed aside."

Senator Charles L. McNary (R., Ore.), minority senate leader, won from Mahoney in the 1936 election by less than 5500 votes.
