MELROSE-ELGAROSE TOWNSEND CLUB TO MEET

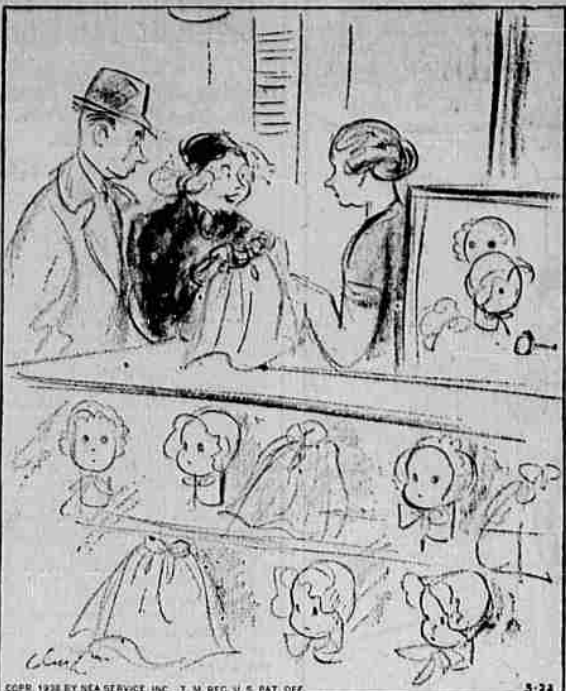
