URGES RETENTION OF SURPLUS PROFIT TAX

Item Needed to Equalize Levy Burdens, Treasury Official States.

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—Roswell Magill, undersecretary of the treasury, appealed to the senate finance committee today to retain the undistributed profits tax.

He told the committee, in which a strong movement for repeal of the tax has been evident, "the treasury favors the retention of a tax upon undistributed corporate earnings as a means of equalizing the distribution of the total tax burden."

Under the tax revision bill passed by the house, Magill said, approximately 88 per cent of the 200,000 corporations which paid taxes in 1936 would be exempt from the undistributed profits tax. The house bill exempts corporations with incomes of less than \$25,000 and Magill declared the house also had attempted to prevent hardships upon corporations both by specified exemptions and by lower rates.

The undersecretary urged re-statement in the bill of the special undistributed profits tax on closely-held corporations which was drafted by the house ways and means committee, but was stricken from the floor of the house.

He said the house ways and means committee's plan was designed "as a safeguard" against deliberate tax avoidance.

Increase Plan Offered
At the same time, Magill submitted treasury estimates on a taxing program suggested in principle by Chairman Harrison (D., Miss.) of the finance committee, a foe of the undistributed profits tax. The treasury estimated that \$10,500,000 more revenue than the house bill

provides could be obtained by the alternate program.

That increase would be realized, the treasury forecast, if a 15 per cent flat rate on capital gains were substituted for the house-approved graduated scale and a flat 15 per cent corporate income tax were substituted for the undistributed profits levy in the house bill.

Another treasury schedule, based on a flat 15 per cent levy on capital gains realized on assets held more than one year and on a flat 18 per cent corporate income tax, would increase by \$17,300,000 the house-approved levies.

The flat rates would bring varying increases in taxes on small corporations.

Under questioning by committee members as to the revenue prospects of broadening the income tax base, Magill said that on the basis of 1937 business conditions a \$70,700,000 revenue gain would be realized if exemptions for married persons were cut from \$2,500 to \$2,000 and for single individuals from \$1,000 to \$800.

After Magill's testimony, the committee closed public hearings. Members will begin revising the house tax revision bill in executive sessions starting Thursday. Chairman Harrison of the committee said he hoped the bill could be reported Saturday.

OREGON CITY, March 22.—(AP)—The Clackamas county grand jury has indicted Charles E. Lynd, 77-year-old woodcutter, on a second degree murder charge in the death of Ernest Robinson, a farmer in the Viola district.

Lynd said he shot Robinson on March 5 in self-defense after a dispute over the division of wood money.

PROTESTANTS OF AUSTRIA GO NAZI

Church Leaders Take Oath of Loyalty to "Beloved Fuehrer" Hitler.

VIENNA, March 22.—(AP)—Austrian Protestants, unlike the church in Germany, has made its peace with the Nazi regime.

Dr. Kauer, president of the Austrian evangelical supreme church council, today became the first church official of any state to swear an oath of loyalty to Adolf Hitler.

It was followed by all his subordinate officials. After the ceremony Dr. Kauer delivered an address which contrasted sharply with the attitude of the Rev. Martin Niemöller, now in a German concentration camp, and the Protestant movement in Germany. He said:

"Every German swears voluntarily in the fullest happiness an oath of loyalty to the beloved Fuehrer, who liberated all Austrians, irrespective of their religious beliefs, from an unbearable yoke."

An Austrian evangelical church has about 300,000 members. Reports from rural Prussia said churches in many smaller towns and villages had draped their altars in black to indicate mourning for Niemöller's continued incarceration. Such churches burn no candles on their altars and have no organ preludes or postludes.

Freud's Home Closed
Sigmund Freud, 83-year-old "father of psychoanalysis," was seriously ill today, close friends said, after a visit of secret Nazi police to his home last night.

The informants said the police took the Jewish scientist's passports and closed the doors of his home. Offices of the company which has published Freud's books also were closed.

Freud was ill when Hitler absorbed Austria into the German realm and for several days was not told of the drastic changes affecting his country and his race.

Bids to Socialists
Indications that Hitler was determined to win Austrian socialists to the Nazi cause by offering them work were given in a ceremony at the Vienna city hall.

(The socialists' conflict with the Dollfuss regime in Austria flared into a local war in Vienna in February, 1934. Hundreds were killed and the socialists were reduced to political impotence. Most of the Vienna workers, whom the party represented, rallied to the support of Kurt Schuschnigg in his last days as chancellor, however.)
