No Hurry

THE government of the United States is being rapidly overhauled, changed, revised, reconstructed and streamlined. This is partly being done with the consent and by the will of the people, but a lot of what is going on is not even being done with direct knowledge by the people.

Sweeping changes in government, changes that will have a direct effect upon nearly every citizen of the country are involved in the government reorganization bill, the new deal's number one project now, yet how many people know what it is all about?

The federal government has three divisions, the legislative, judicial and executive departments. The voters thoroughly overhauled the legislative branch in the 1936 election. They also made a change in the executive department in 1933 when the old deal went out and the new deal came in. Though those changes were great indeed, they were but the beginning—merely the start of what was to follow. But what came next was not passed upon by the people. They voted confidence in the new deal administration but they did not vote to have the supreme court packed to suit the administration nor did they vote to have the federal government streamlined and rebuilt. The people have not had a chance to vote upon the proposition of whether or not the chief executive should be given more power.

If a reasonable and proper procedure were to be followed with reference to the proposed reorganization of the federal government it should be made the issue of the forthcoming presidential campaign. It is too fundamental to be foisted upon the people by a landslide congress that jumps through hoops at the executive's bidding. Let the voters decide whether or not the presidents of the future are to have 10 times the power and authority that presidents have had during the last 150 years. There is no hurry. In fact there is a very good reason for not hurrying with this reorganization

scheme. The reorganizing will be done by a man who will be in the closing months of his final (if tradition is followed) term as president. A new executive should certainly be permitted to do his own reorganizing if it is the will of congress and the people, following an election campaign on the subject, that such a measure be passed.

ASHURST OUT OF SENATOR CONTEST

Judge, Opposing Mahoney, Will Support Donagh or Holman.

KLAMATH FALLS, March 22.—(AP)—Edward B. Ashurst, Klamath county circuit judge and an announced candidate for the democratic nomination to the U. S. senate, today issued a formal statement of withdrawal from the race.

Ashurst indicated he would throw his support to U. S. District Attorney Carl Donagh and, in event Donagh fails to win the democratic nomination, to Rufus C. Holman, republican candidate. The judge offered "financial reasons" in explanation of his withdrawal.

Ashurst's statement praised both Donagh and Holman and sharply criticized Willis Mahoney, a third democratic candidate for the senate, whom the judge charged with being an advocate of a "wide open town" while serving as mayor of Klamath Falls.

"Should the democrats of this state in an hour of infantile weakness," the statement continued, "nominate Mr. Mahoney, then the home-loving, law-abiding democrats who stand for clean government and for law and order and for the suppression of vice will join in the election of Mr. Rufus C. Holman, who like Mr. Donagh has always stood for and stands for justice, for law and for order and for clean government."

SHIRLEY TEMPLE WINS LIBEL ACTION

LONDON, March 22.—(AP)—Shirley Temple of the movies has been awarded \$10,000 in public settlement of a libel action based on an article which appeared Oct. 28, 1937, in "Night and Day," a London journal which has since discontinued publication.

Lord Chief Justice Hewart termed the article a "gross outrage." Sir Patrick Hastings, plaintiff's counsel, refused to read the "heavily" publication in court but said it was "one of the most libelous articles I can imagine about a child nine years of age."

The libel action was brought against the author of the article, Graham Greene, the proprietors of the journal, the publisher and the printer.

The Twentieth Century Fox company, which produced "Wee Willie Winkle," a picture starring Shirley, also was a plaintiff in the suit. It was awarded \$7,500.
