MARKET SPEEDS COLLECTION WORK

Use of bookkeeping machinery in the county tax collecting department is resulting in much saving to the various taxing districts of the county, D. H. Lemox, treasurer, reports.

New equipment installed in the tax department early this year, speeds up the bookkeeping work and permits regular monthly turnovers by the tax collectors to the treasurer. These turnovers are made each week of each month, and the treasurer sends out checks to school, port and other special districts the first week of the following month. These regular distributions enable districts to call warrants at frequent intervals and thereby save on interest charges. Prior to installation of the machines, turnovers were less frequent, due to the great amount of labor involved.

The machine also provides greater accuracy, as it affords a system of checks and balances precluding error in distribution of cash and posting and also disclosing any error in calculation of tax by the writers of tax statements and furthermore assuring proper distribution of the money collected.
