18-16 LOVE AFFAIR ENDS IN HOMICIDE

NEW YORK, March 24.—(AP)—

A juvenile love affair that went awry ended in the fatal shooting of an 18-year-old stenographer today and the technical arrest of a 16-year-old retired army officer's son.

The victim, Charlotte Mattison, was found dead in the suburban Jackson Heights apartment of Donald F. Carroll Sr., a certified public accountant since his retirement from the army several years ago.

District Attorney Sullivan of Queens ordered Carroll's son, Donald Jr., a freshman at New York university, held for questioning.

Police said it was young Carroll who called them to the apartment shortly after noon, saying: "Send some one. Help is needed."

Detectives who first questioned young Carroll said he told them he had intended to shoot himself.

"The dead girl's mother," Mrs. Fred Mattison, said her daughter had been "keeping company" with young Carroll for about two years. "But they were not engaged," she sobbed. "They were too young. They were just very good friends."

Friends of young Carroll described him as mature for his age and said he was extremely interested in political ideologies.

ROOSEVELT RAPPED IN MORGAN OUSTER

WASHINGTON, March 24.—

(AP)—Representative Hoffman (R., Mich.), accused President Roosevelt in the house today of ignoring violations of law by his supporters.

The chief executive, Hoffman said, should remember that "disregard of a constitutional duty imposed on an official is cause for impeachment."

The president's explanation of his removal of Dr. Arthur E. Morgan as chairman of the Tennessee valley authority, Hoffman asserted, "has a hollow ring—falls on deaf ears when we recall that his political bedfellows exacted political contributions for his benefit from corporations in violation of the corrupt practices act."

He also said that John L. Lewis, whose United Mine Workers contributed half a million dollars to the president's campaign "openly, defiantly and brazenly defied the authorities of state and nation" during the eve of sit-down strikes in Michigan's automobile industry.

"Lewis and the president's political bedfellows who exacted tri-

bute from corporations had political power," Hoffman said. "They controlled votes. Morgan has neither."

Representative Bacon of New York later came forward with other republican criticism of the administration by presenting to the house today documentary evidence of what he called a "demoralizing national scandal involving postmaster appointments."

He said his information showed that President Roosevelt should not be given some powers assigned him by the reorganization bill, now pending in the senate.

The New Yorker listed 235 cases in which, he said, the "highest eligible person" had not been appointed to postmasterships. He said the cases covered 43 states.

U. S. SPENDING FOR OREGON ROADS HUGE

SALEM, March 24.—(AP)—

The federal government spent \$28,768,041 during the past seven years on 476 Oregon highway projects, the state adding \$9,326,372 and counties and railroads paying \$427,637, State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldock reported today to the board of control.

The total cost of the projects was \$38,496,651, but Baldock estimated that only \$31,359,848 in worthwhile work was accomplished. He said the work done with the federal grants was 81 per cent efficient.

Projects including grading, surfacing, oiling and paving roads, bridge construction, the highway radio telephone network, surveys and tunnel building.

Cost of projects aided by federal relief agencies included national recovery \$10,346,000, federal highway aid \$8,477,843, WPA \$4,560,191, works program \$5,627,902, and PWA \$5,434,678.

Baldock said the federal expenditures "advanced the highway construction program about four and a half years, which gives the public the benefit of these needed improvements now. However, it will still require many years to complete and modernize the state highway system."

The federal aid provided 23,648,000 man hours of employment.
