NEW YORK—This year blouses are a real fashion story. The smart girl who buys her spring suit early gets busy immediately and figures out ways and means to make it do double, even triple, duty. She haunts the accessory counters, especially the blouse departments. And, in addition to blouses, she chooses a variety of necklaces, belts and gloves, then doesn't worry another minute about her wardrobe until it's time to buy silk dresses.

There are the ballerina type blouses, cut full to blouse over skirt bands. These usually have full sleeves, little girl necklines, and are so genuinely flattering that they're fun to wear by themselves as well as under suit jackets.

Neat, tailored linen and washable silk blouses, cut on shirt-maker lines, come in bright as well as pastel shades. And are wonderful for the business girl, or the routine hours of any woman's life.

Cloque Organdy
For the days when you have an important lunch date or expect to

wear your suit to tea, perhaps even to dinner, shirred chiffon, lace-trimmed hand-made, suave organdy blouses are ideal.

The organdy picture is an interesting one this season. Swiss cloque organdies in lovely new prints were an outstanding feature of a recent New York fashion show, and are used to make many lovely blouses. One popular cloque version is in multi-colored floral prints, generally combining deep and pastel tones.

Chenille-flecked Swiss organdies take on new style interest through clever patterning. A black organdy blouse appears with a widely spaced chenille design of numbers from 1 to 10, scattered in velvety pink over the dark sheer background.

Many new print ideas are shown on very fine clear organdy. A small paisley motif in deep red, green, yellow and black against a white ground is an attractive blouse material, especially for a gray suit. A design of little white plumes scattered over a pink ground makes a frilly lingerie blouse for a navy suit. Close all over designs in floral and broken

geometric figures brightly colored, appear in chic costume blouses.

Given a good suit in navy, gray or black, it's not difficult to figure out accessory combinations that have an air about them. You need one dark, practical group, of course (navy hat, bag and shoes for a navy or gray suit, black ones for black), but the rest should be gay—even a little breathtaking.

One woman we know got a simply handsome navy suit, all-skirted with a rather soft, single-breasted jacket, and navy shoes, hat, bag and gloves. The hat is finished with a huge Chinese red poppy and her scarf matches it. Now she's looking for a new blouse and suede boots to match.
