STEDFAST CLASS HAS ENJOYABLE SOCIAL MEETING THURSDAY

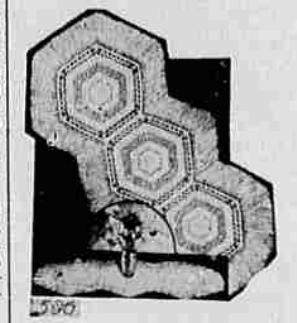
