ROSEBURG COUNTRY CLUB SEASON OPENING AFFAIR TO BE SATURDAY NIGHT

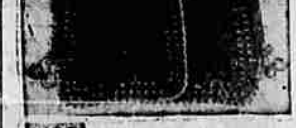
