## POISON GRAIN FOR SQUIRRELS OFFERED

Digger squirrels can best be controlled through the use of poison grain early in the spring as they emerge from their winter quarters and before there is an abundance of feed available. Digger squirrels, as they come from winter hibernation, feed largely upon grass and roots and will take grain more readily than after farm crops reach maturity. States County Agent J. Roland Parker, and every squirrel killed at this time of the year, is equal to three or four squirrels later in the season.

Poison grain has been made available to farmers in all communities through the county agent's office cooperating with the U. S. biological survey. Poison barley is used as it is not readily picked up by farm poultry and game birds and as it has proven more efficient in the control of digger squirrels. It should be put out along the run-ways, fences, stumps and other places where the digger squirrels tend to have

their run-ways. It is not advisable to place the poison grain in the mouth of the burrows of the squirrels, as they often cover the grain as they run to and from their dens and will not take the grain, thus placed as readily as they will that in other places.

Poison grain is made available at cost to farmers through local distributing points and distributing points in all communities at country stores and feed supply houses. A supply is also kept on hand at the county agent's office.
