WIFE OF 16 MONTHS ASKS DIVORCE ON CRUELTY CLAIM

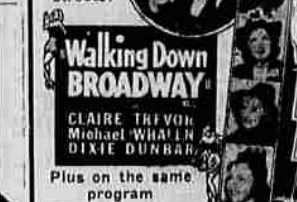
