By signing an elaborately embossed proclamation, Governor Charles H. Martin of Oregon officially launched the annual campaign of Columbia Empire Industries, Inc., April 1st to 10th, for the avowed purpose of creating greater opportunity for employment through increased consumption of products of this area.

In his message "to help the people of Oregon," Governor Martin said: "Having the welfare of our people at heart, it is my desire that every industry of the Columbia Empire be working at full capacity so as to insure a real demand for the products of our soil, and make the day of unemployment a thing of the past."

"I have always believed that the buying of products grown or manufactured within this area provides opportunity for work for prospective employment—and that, in turn,

SCOUT CIRCUS TO BE HELD MAY 14

Roseburg and Green Station Troops Apply for Entry in Event at Eugene.

Boy scout troops number 71, Roseburg, and 76, Green station, are the first in the district to make formal application to participate in the Wallamette Area council scout circus, to be held at Eugene, May 14. This is to be the eighth circus to be put on by boy scouts of the area during the past 10 years and all troops have been sent information outlining the plan for participation and achievement. The circus will be done in seven acts at McArthur court on the evening of the 14th of May with approximately 1,000 scouts taking part in the following program:

Act 1—Grand entry and opening ceremony.
Act 2—Signaling, with scout-made semaphore flags.
Act 3—Firebuilding, without matches by friction and flint and steel.
Act 4—Scout activity games demonstration.
Act 5—Chariot race—scout made chariots.
Act 6—Scouting and pioneering demonstrations.
Act 7—Finale and closing ceremony.

30 Troops Expected.

It is expected that more than 30 troops will take part in this spectacular scout project and that five thousand people will witness it. Preparations are in progress for special features by sea scouts and senior groups during the circus, according to R. W. Doman, field scout executive for the area.

Both troops 4 and 7 of Roseburg have indicated their intention to participate in the circus, but to date have not formally filed application. Harry Howe, scoutmaster of troop 71, is being assisted by Harold Bowerman and Hugh Whipple, with Elwood Nelson and Clarence Moore directing the patrols of scouts.

The Green troop is scoutmastered by R. L. Preston, who is assisted by Lewis Insley and Patrol Leaders Corleton Preston, Melvin Acee, and Bob Insley. This latter troop has only recently been organized with W. A. Davis as chairman representing the P. T. A. sponsoring organization.
