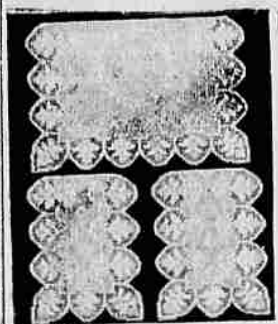
MRS. KENNETH BAUGH CELEBRATES BIRTHDAY

FAVORITE RECIPES

Date Crunches

Blend together:
1/2 lb. Honey Maid Grahams rolled fine
1 1/2 cups sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated)
1/2 lb. (1 cup) pitted dates, cut in bits
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Drop by spoonfuls on greased baking sheet. Bake 15 minutes in a moderately hot oven. Remove from pan immediately. Makes 3 dozen.

Honey Maid Apple Sauce Cake

Cream together:
1/2 cup shortening
1/2 cup sugar
Add to 3/4 Honey Maid Grahams, rolled fine:
1/4 teaspoon ground cloves
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
1/2 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
Mix with creamed mixture along with 1 cup of apple sauce, cooked to "mushy" stage. Stir until smooth. Pour into greased oblong pan. Bake almost one hour in a moderate oven. One half cup raisins or nuts, or both, may be added with dry ingredients. Also dates. No eggs, milk or flour—la! Frost over, if you wish, with a white powdered sugar frosting.

Petite Napoleons

You'll need:
18 Honey Maid Grahams
2 tablespoons butter
4 bananas
1 1/2 cups thick custard filling
3/4 cup powdered sugar
Hot water
Orange flavoring
Spread crackers with butter and toast quickly in hot oven. Cover 6 toasted crackers with sliced bananas, then with a layer of the cold custard. Top with another cracker, more banana and custard. Cover with a third cracker. Make a frosting of the powdered sugar, hot water or milk, and orange flavoring. Place in refrigerator to chill. At serving time, cut each in half from top to bottom.
