Thinks F. R. Blundered In one phase of the debate Representative Barton (R-N.Y.), an advertising man, said President Roosevelt had not employed "good advertising practice" in making public a letter in which he disclaimed any inclination to be a dictator.

Barton said one of the first things he learned as an advertiser was not to put doubts into the minds of people. The president, he said, put dictatorship into the minds of 130,000,000 people, "many of whom had never thought of it before."

Tobey (R-N.Y.) asserted enactment of the bill would make the controller general "serve with a sword of Damocles hanging over his head."

The senate bill abolishes the controller's office; the house continues it but modifies its functions. House in Tumult Tumultuous scenes continued on the floor. McCormack (D-Mass.), presiding, was forced to caution crammed galleries not to applaud. "And step by step more force and coercion must be applied until all liberty — economic and personal and political — is lost. Decries Alliance Idea "If we join with the two other powerful democracies, Great Britain and France, we are engaging ourselves in an alliance directed against Germany and Italy and all the satellites they can collect."

"Such a combination of democracies would at once result in combining the autocracies against the democracies. It could have all the hideous elements of old religious wars."

"We should have none of it. If the world is to keep the peace, then we must keep peace with dictatorships as well as with popular governments."

However, he said, the nation could and should join "in the collective moral forces," as distinguished from those of economic or military force, for peace.

"In summary, in the larger issues of world relations, our words should be absolute independence of political action and adequate preparedness."

annual \$3,000 exemption from gift tax. Existing law—Same as senate committee provisions. Excise taxes.

Both the senate committee and house bills would repeal existing excise levies on toilet articles, fur, phonograph records, cameras and lenses, chewing gum and imported Norway pine and northern white pine.

The house voted a 6-cent pound-levy on imported pork products and a 25-cent increase in the \$2 gallonage liquor tax. Both these were eliminated by the senate committee.

Existing law—Inclusion in income of 80 per cent of gains on assets held from one to two years, with the percentage ranging down to 20 per cent of gains on assets held more than 10 years. Inclusion of all gains on assets held one year and less.

Exemptions Also Suffer Estate and gift taxes. Senate committee—Allowance of \$40,000 exemption from gift tax and \$40,000 from estate tax, and separate annual exemption of \$5,000 from gift tax.

House—Allowance of one \$40,000 exemption from both the estate and gift taxes, and separate
