NEW YORK.—The smartest new spring costumes for every hour of a woman's life are practical, conservative. They are, indeed, according to a poll of doctors, lawyers, merchants, chiefs and radio announcers, conducted recently in New York, exactly the kind of clothes men like to see women wear.

Men, it seems, usually are unaware of high style points, but they instantly spot careless tailoring and object violently to bad grooming. They see women—not their clothes. Which brings right home again all the things we've learned about the importance of having a few dresses and one outfit which fit perfectly. Even if this

means spending money on alterations that equal to the cost of another dress.

For "Background" Frocks

The one hundred men who answered the questions of the fashion staff of Rockefeller Center's magazine voted unanimously for the type of dress women know as background frocks. These have simple necklines that lend themselves admirably to a variety of collars, Jewels and so on. Their bodices, flatter the figure. Their skirts mold hips, often flare slightly at the hemline.

When asked about a simple street dress of pale blue wool, appropriately named "Nine-to-Five," fifty men said "Swell."
