## ROSEBURG EYED FOR STORAGE SYSTEM

W. G. Garver of Woodburn is spending a few days in Roseburg investigating the city as a possible site for a cold storage locker system. These plants, Mr. Garver reports, are spreading rapidly and are very popular in cities where they have been installed. They provide a number of lockers, which are rented by farmers and city residents for storage of perishable foods, each renter having an individual locker. They permit meats, fruits, berries and vegetables to be kept in fresh condition for indefinite periods of time. Mr. Garver reports, and are very popular with city dwellers who are thus enabled to buy produce in season and keep it in fresh condition for use months later. The lockers, he reports, are extremely popular in the Willamette valley, where residents enjoy the novelty of serving fresh strawberries during the winter season. The lockers, he reports, also are widely used by farmers for storage until better prices for produce are obtainable.
