## EVANGELIST DATED AT NAZARENE MEET

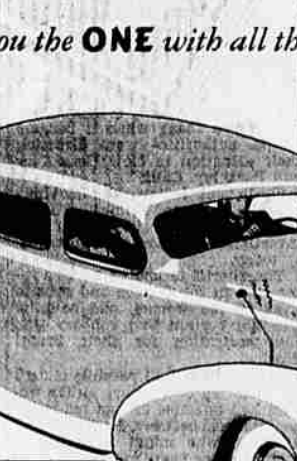
