TONGUE POINT BASE CAUSE SEEMS LOST

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Oregon and Washington congressmen appear to be fighting for a "lost cause" so far as obtaining federal approval of a naval air base at Tongue Point, Ore., is concerned.

Not so very long ago they were enthusiastically confident. They said they had gone to the white house and received presidential assurances that \$1,000,000 would soon be forthcoming.

Now comes word, they add, that presidential aides remain "dead set" against the base and as a result the chief executive has decided to let the matter drop.

One congressman added it did not appear that congress would take any action without word from the white house and the war and navy departments.

TEST SURVIVED BY BLUM GOVERNMENT

Approval Given to Finance Bill, Branded "Copy of Roosevelt Failure."

PARIS, April 6.—(AP)—Premier Blum's demand for emergency powers over France's finances passed its first crucial test today when the chamber of deputies after a bitter debate voted approval of his financial bill by the small majority of 60.

The official count of the vote, on which the socialist premier had staked the life of his government, was 310 to 250.

The smallness of this majority, however, was viewed in political circles as encouraging the senate to proceed with its expected rejection of the bill when it votes Friday.

The premier's bill would give the government power until July 1 to take by decree any action deemed necessary to provide funds for the expanding national defense program, stabilize the franc and protect the national economy.

A tax on capital, a two-year suspension of payments on the national debt, a measure of foreign exchange control and revaluation of the Bank of France's gold are some of the measures contemplated.

Branded "Roosevelt Copy"
The bill, successively termed Marxian, Nazi and Rooseveltian by opposition speakers, provoked one of the most heated debates in the chamber for years.

At one point the opposing factions almost came to blows, the premier himself having to rush to the floor to separate them.

The debate former Premier Flandin today told the deputies that Blum's demand for decree powers was a "copy" of President Roosevelt's "experiment which has failed."

The rightist party deputy, first in chamber debate to compare the financial and economic powers sought by Blum with Roosevelt's new deal measures, said: "The American experiment must show us that the controlled economy the premier proposes will not work."

OREGON HOP MEN SUE EX-BREWERS

KANSAS CITY, April 6.—(AP)—The hop market collapse with the advent of national prohibition in 1933 was at issue yesterday in the third trial of a civil suit.

T. A. Livesley, John J. Roberts and the estate of A. Hatstrom all of Salem, Ore., sued to collect \$13,125 from Abe, Jack, Joe and Dan Danciger, formerly brewery operators who now live in Fort Worth, Tex.

They alleged the Danciger brothers, including M. O. Danciger, since deceased, contracted to buy 150,000 pounds of hops for delivery in 1920, but that in September the brothers quit the brewery business and refused acceptance.

The complainants said the money they sought was the difference between the contract price of 85 cents a pound and the market price for which the hops eventually sold.

The Danciger brothers alleged in previous suits that their legal advisors told them the use of hops was illegal under national prohibition.

The Oregonians were given a \$5,000 verdict in a previous trial, and the Danciger brothers won another. Both were reversed by the Missouri supreme court.

MIDNIGHT BELL GETS VERDICT OVER LABOA

PORTLAND, April 6.—(AP)—Midnight Bell, 157, Portland negro, outpointed Al Laboa, 160, San Jose, Calif., to win a 10-round decision in a hard-fought main event here last night.

Combating a weight and reach advantage, Bell scored in heavy toe-to-toe slugging. Neither man was knocked down.

In the semi-final, Joey Ponce, 137, Los Angeles, Calif., won a 6-round decision from Johnny Hall, 128, Seattle, despite two knock-downs. Ponce used his superior reach to outclass the battling Hall.

WASHINGTON, April 5.—(AP)—A \$25,000 appropriation for restoration of Dr. John McLaughlin's home at Oregon City was reported favorably yesterday by the senate appropriations committee. The bill previously passed the house.

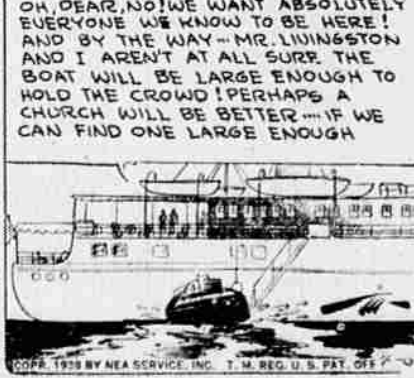
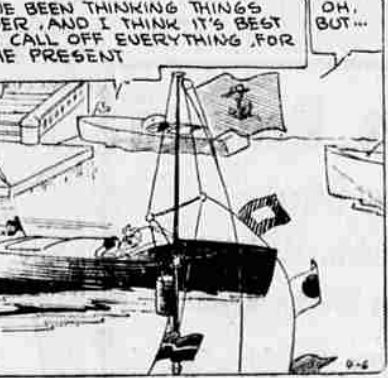
