

N. Y. BANKS GIVEN

INSURANCE PERMIT

ALBANY, N. Y., April 6.—(AP)—Sale of life insurance by savings banks beginning next January 1, a plan designed chiefly for persons in the lower income groups, was authorized today by Governor Lehman's signature to a bill he had recommended to the 1938 legislature.

The law makes insurance an over-the-counter commodity, available to state residents at savings banks which elect to enter the business under the permissive provisions. Solicitors and collectors are excluded from the sales system.

Purchasers will be limited to a maximum of \$1,000 in any one bank, or \$5,000 in the aggregate, underwritten by three or more banks.

Rates charged by Massachusetts savings banks for the same type of insurance have been cited as indicative of what may be charged by New York banks.

A policyholder in Massachusetts pays a \$12.84 annual premium for \$1,000 of straight life insurance at the age of 19, \$16.18 at the age of 20, with annual dividends of \$6.58; \$23.30 at the age of 35, with dividends of \$7.22.

M'NARY CRITICIZES

DUTY CONCESSIONS

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Senator McNary, minority leader of the senate, sharply criticized Tuesday tariff concessions on what he described as "unprotected" agricultural products in the administration's reciprocal trade program.

Testifying at hearings on proposed negotiations with Canada, McNary told the committee for reciprocity information none of the agricultural items asked for concessions was in the farm bill recently passed by congress.

"You are making too many concessions on this type of agricultural product," the senator said.

"Why don't you single out some of the products which are subsidized in the farm bill?" McNary opposed concessions on lumber, cherries and poultry.

In response to a statement by Committee Chairman Henry F. Grady that the reciprocal trade program was designed to help both industry and agriculture McNary said:

"I appreciate what you are trying to do but it looks to me like you are making more concessions on agriculture than you are on industry."

NEW NAZI PRIMER
STRIKES AT JEWS

BERLIN, April 6.—(AP)—Julius Streicher's first reader is just off the press.

It carries on where the anti-semitic primer published by Streicher, Germany's number one anti-semitic, a year ago left off.

The new book contains several narrow escapes in adventure stories such as "What Happened to the Jewish Doctor?" and "How a Jew Treats His Female Servants."

Streicher's reader does not overlook the religious angle. The story, "What Christ Said About the Jews," contains the admonition: "Whenever you see a cross remember the gruesome murder committed by the Jews on Golgotha."

"Remember that the Jews are children of the devil and murderers of mankind. Whoever is a murderer deserves to be killed himself."

Other stories in the reader are entitled, "Are there any decent Jews?" "Money is the Jewish God," "How two women were swindled by Jewish lawyers," and so forth.

OREGON CITY, April 6.—(AP)—Circuit Judge E. C. Latourette sentenced Douglas Day, 60, to a 10-year prison sentence and his 17-year-old companion, Harold Manning, to five years today for the attempted robbery of a Mullins store.

U. S. OUSTER HITS
CAPTAIN MCLAGLEN

LOS ANGELES, April 5.—(AP)—In a dramatic court session, Superior Judge Ambrose decreed today that Capt. Leopold McLaglen, brother of Film Actor Victor McLaglen, must leave the United States for five years to escape serving a prison sentence in an extortion case.

The dashing ex-British army officer, who became a Hollywood physical education instructor was convicted recently. He was accused of trying to extort \$20,000 from his former employer, Philip Chancellor, youthful Beverly Hills millionaire.

At his trial, McLaglen denied extortion charges, contending Chancellor owed him the money for preparing a book, which Chancellor later decided not to bring out.

GRIM NOTE PUT IN

U. S. "ARMY DAY"

WASHINGTON, April 6.—(AP)—Twenty-one years after America's entry into the world war, the nation observed Army day today in the midst of unparalleled peacetime preparedness.

Roaring planes, rumbling artillery, and the tread of troops added a grim note to parades of civilian patriotic organizations in scores of cities.

President Roosevelt, who told congress in January the national defense was "inadequate for purposes of national security," arranged to review a parade of more than 12,000 troops and civilians here this afternoon.

A world arms race, wars in Spain and China and threats of conflict elsewhere have stirred the administration to strengthen materially the nation's land and sea defenses in the last year.

The senate has under consideration a \$489,000,000 war department appropriation bill, \$40,000,000 higher than the total approved last month by the house. It is the largest in 18 years.

Both chambers have approved a \$550,000,000 navy appropriation, also a record outlay since the 1922 Washington treaty halted an arms race. On top of this, the house has voted to authorize the general 20 per cent increase in the navy recommended by the president.

SALMON DERBY
PRIZES OFFERED

More than \$100 in cash and merchandise prizes already have been listed for the chinook salmon fishing derby, scheduled to open April 24, it was announced today. Opening date for the contest may be postponed, however, it was stated, if the run fails to appear by the time tentatively set.

Salmon fishermen are urged by Paul Dempsey, chairman of the derby organization, to register immediately. Only fishermen who have registered in advance will be eligible for prizes. Registration fees will be used for prizes. Awards will be made weekly with grand prizes for the season.
