ANTI-WAR SENATOR LANE REMEMBERED

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—The grave of Harry Lane of Oregon, one of six United States senators who voted against American participation in the World war, was surrounded yesterday by a quiet little group commemorating Army day, 21st anniversary of America's entry into the conflict.

Senator George W. Norris of Nebraska, a survivor of the dissenting group 21 years ago, telegraphed, "Harry Lane gave up his life to voice his honest convictions."

Lane died five weeks later.

Other messages to the group included those from Governor Philip F. La Follette of Wisconsin, Governor Elmer A. Benson of Minnesota, Congressman Knute N. Hill of Washington, and Miss Jeannette Rankin, first woman member of congress.

Exempt both the veterans administration and the education bureau from reorganization.

Reserve to congress the right to approve any reorganization order before it went into effect by means of a resolution which would require the president's signature.

Under house procedure, a vote on the Bollean amendment was scheduled to precede the vote on the education proposal by Warren.

takings financed by federal appropriations and providing for the construction of homes, multiple-family houses and apartment buildings.

Behind the entire program lies the president's desire to stimulate heavy industries as a means of giving all business new impetus.

Chairman Jesse H. Jones of the reconstruction finance corporation advised business men today he would consider their loan applications individually.

"I have no fixed rules for handling applications. I consider each one on its own merits," Jones explained in discussing the broadened lending power to be conferred on the RFC by congress.

The legislation will go to the white house for President Roosevelt's signature as soon as minor differences between the house and senate versions are reconciled.

Longer Terms Provided
"The main thing this bill does for business men," Jones continued, "is to permit them to get loans from us for longer terms."

Formerly the RFC could make business loans only until 1945. The new measure removes that limitation, and loans for as long as 15 or 20 years may result, Jones said many utilities probably will become interested in this long-term money.

(As head of the RFC, Jones is taking personal charge of the new lending program and handling the details. His colleagues on the board, of course, share in the final approval of loans.)

Assuring he always has been liberal in demands for collateral, the R. F. C. head indicated he would not relax any security requirements in making the new loans, although the pending bill virtually authorizes unsecured "character" loans.

Reasonable Security Asked
What kind of security will Jones accept? His reply again was, "every-

case is different."

Some business men, for instance, pledge real estate or securities to assure repayment of loans. Jones said he would accept any kind of collateral which would provide "reasonable" assurance of repayment.

The bill also permits the RFC to make capital investments in private businesses, but Jones asserted this did not mean he would buy any stock. If the borrower wants to use the money for capital purposes, such as building new factories, that's all right, but the government is only going to lend him the money, not invest it in his future.

How much money will Jones lend?

The RFC, he said, has potential loan powers of about \$1,500,000,000, one on its own merits. Jones explained in discussing the broadened lending power to be conferred on the RFC by congress.

How can a business man get a loan?

The first place to go is to the home town bank. If the bank doesn't want to make the loan on its own responsibility, the RFC might underwrite it, or if the bank will grant only part of the loan, the RFC may loan the balance.

But if the bank won't do anything about the loan, the next place to go is to the nearest of the 32 RFC branch offices.

Randolph, who came here recently from Klamath Falls. Twenty-two acres of this land was formerly the Vail estate sold to Kenneth McKenzie, of Las Plumas, Cal., who in turn sold it to the Belchers.

The new owners plan extensive improvements, including barns which will house ten dairy cows and other buildings necessary to the dairy business. Later they plan an up-to-date log house. Mr. and Mrs. Randolph took possession of their new home this week.

gressive system of taxation."

As chairman of the senate finance committee, Harrison directed the revamping of the house-approved revenue measure. His committee group struck from the house bill the administration's proposed undistributed profits tax and drastically revised the levy on capital gains.

The changes were designed to provide new stimulus for the nation's business.

Changes Pointed Out

The undistributed profits tax, Harrison asserted, had proved "damning" to business and "so complicated in its working that it has brought about the almost unanimous condemnation on the part of business interests of the country."

"Tax laws," he declared, "ought to be as simple as they can be made."

Under the house bill, he added, corporation profits would be taxed at a flat 20 per cent, with a provision for a reduction of two per cent in the rate for a 50 per cent distribution of earnings, and a four per cent reduction for corporations distributing all of their earnings to stockholders.

The senate finance committee, Harrison explained, recommended a flat tax of 18 per cent on corporations with income of more than \$25,000 to replace the house undistributed profits tax.

"With an 18 per cent flat rate, the corporations can understand what their taxes are going to be," Harrison said.

"If you take the house provisions of this bill there is hardly a lawyer in Washington or a senator in the

Predicts Revenue Shortage

Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich) predicted that revenue from the bill would fall \$1,000,000,000 short of estimates.

Treasury experts have estimated income from the house-approved revenue measure at about \$2,329,000,000. They have said changes approved by the senate finance committee would increase this amount by \$20,000,000.

"The treasury frankly said the estimates were based on business conditions at the close of 1936," Vandenberg told reporters. "Since then all the business indices have been moving downward."

history and a temperature of 39. Thousands of dollars damage was caused by hail and thunderstorm at San Antonio.

A brief sub-freezing cold wave accompanied by rain was forecast for the south from Oklahoma to northwest Florida. Strong northerly winds were reported along the Louisiana and Texas gulf coast.

Rain, sleet, dust, hail and tornado winds lashed at sections of the nation which escaped the snowstorm.

Snow Plows Put to Work

Heavy, wet snowdrifts three and

four feet deep challenged highway crews in the middle west. Snow plows, hastily retrieved from summer storage, opened most principal highways but many rural lanes were still choked.

The snowfall broke April records in many cities and was the deepest of the winter at some spots. Conditions in southwest Michigan reported 30 to 25 inches of snow.

One death was reported in South Dakota and fears were felt for a man missing in the vicinity of Scottsbluff, Neb., where snow ranged up to a foot in depth. Westington Springs, S. D., reported 17 inches of snow.

Hundreds of telephone and telegraph poles snapped under the weight of snow and ice in Nebraska and Iowa. Many rural schools were closed in Iowa and South Dakota because of snow-choked highways. The storm disrupted bus service in southern Wisconsin.

NEW YORK, April 7.—(AP)—Confronted with the heaviest April snowfall in 14 years—33 to 4 inches—New York City called out 15,000 emergency workers today to augment the regular street cleaning force of 9,000 men.

Hose gangs were put to work throughout the five boroughs, flushing off snow that was too soft to cart away. It was a heavier snowfall than any this winter.

Temperatures, which hovered just below the freezing mark, were expected to rise today and the weather bureau predicted the snow would change to rain.

two months of fighting among the 500,000 troops engaged along the Yellow river were known to be large.

Chinese said 4,000 Japanese were killed in the battle at Taiherchwang alone.

In Shanghai Dr. Herman Liu, president of the American-Supported Shanghai college, was killed by gunmen on an international settlement street.

Because of his backing of the war against Japan his friends believed the assassination was inspired by anti-Chinese elements. He was a graduate of Columbia university and the University of Chicago.

One of his assassins was killed and three other Chinese, believed to be bystanders, were wounded in the exchange of shots.

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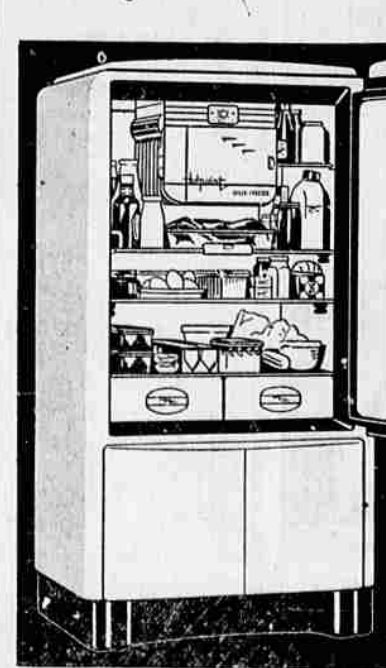
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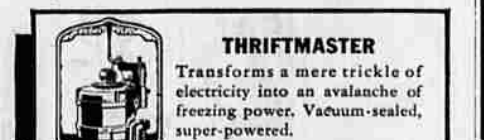


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
