NOTED SALVATION ARMY EXECUTIVE WILL SPEAK HERE



Commissioner Benjamin Orames, above, territorial commander of The Salvation Army for the vast western area, comprising the eleven Pacific coast states and Hawaii, will visit Roseburg Friday for an important series of meetings arranged under the direction of Major Ronald Eberhart, local division commander.

Commissioner Orames is an outstanding Salvationist. He is strong physically and well suited to the strenuous work of administering relief and spiritual aid to the thousands of Americans, Scandinavians, Hawaiians, Japanese, Chinese, Mexicans, Filipinos, Koreans, Porto Ricans and others whom the Army served in his wide flung command.

He is fitted for the work because he has seen hard exacting service in Australia, Egypt, the world war in French battlefields, China and this country.

Before coming to the United States, he served more than two years as territorial commander for North China where he laid the foundation and built the first Salvation Army training college in the Orient, at Peiping. His war service was so excellent that he was chosen to become chief secretary for southern Australia. A few years later the call to China saw him spring quickly to attention, salute and with his very capable and characteristic shoulder shrug, rap out his soldierly, "Certainly."

Then followed strenuous months in a strange land of widespread famine and destruction. North China, new to the Salvation Army, was a great area of hunger. The Army opened "porridge kitchens" and literally fed thousands daily. At the same time the great work of Christian education and human service progressed.

AMNESIA VICTIM'S IDENTITY CLEARED

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—An amnesia victim, semi-conscious part of the time since his confinement in a Portland hospital, was identified yesterday by a Spokane, Wash., salesman as J. B. Williams, former Peashastin, Wash., barber.

The 33-year-old man's father, H. S. Williams, Peashastin, Chelan county, assessor's assistant, verified the identification in a telephone call here.

Williams wandered into police headquarters here Saturday, unable to recall his name, and complained of a headache.

SLUMP BLAMED ON INVENTORY PRICES

PORTLAND, April 7.—(AP)—Heavy inventories held at high prices were blamed yesterday by J. J. Klingler, general manager of the Pontiac division, General Motors corporation, for the business recession.

"Those heavy inventories had to be liquidated while manufacturers were keeping production in check," he said in an interview. "Daylight is beginning to show just over the hill."

5 CHANGES MADE IN BASKETBALL RULES

CHICAGO, April 7.—(AP)—Five changes—two of them designed to give players of the streamlined game more rest—were written into the basketball rule book today.

The changes, adopted by the rules committee of the national association of basketball coaches, were:

1. Increase of the number of time outs in the collegiate game to five from four.

2. Optional use of four 10-minute quarters instead of the customary 20-minute halves, with two minute rests between first and second and between third and fourth periods.

3. Exemption of the outer half of the foul circle from provisions of the "three second" rule so that a player not in possession of the ball may stay in that territory more than three seconds without penalty.

4. Prohibition of substitutions immediately after a goal and before the ball is tossed into play from the end zone, unless a team has called time out.

5. Permission for optional extension of the end margin of the court from 2 feet to 1 foot from the face of the backboards.

No extra time outs were provided for high school games, but all official ruled referees must call an official time out in the second and fourth quarters if no time has been called by either team during the first four minutes in those periods.

In addition, scholastic deadballs will be decided in a "sudden death" overtime session. The first team to score two points—on goal or free throw—will win. If the three-minute period ends with a tied score, the team scoring will be declared winner.

The only other new matter in next season's rule book will be a rewritten "ten second" rule for clarification, with no change.

SALVESON STARS 2 WAYS IN L. A. WIN

There were whisperings today in the San Diego Padres dressing rooms of a plot to steal the eye glasses of Pitcher Jack Salveson of the Los Angeles team in the Pacific Coast league.

Salveson, who wears eyeglasses while he works, was taught on the Padres more ways than one yesterday. He not only pitched a fair brand of ball as the Angels defeated the Padres, 7 to 3, but he accounted for three of his team's runs with a homer with one on base and a single.

She packed, booked for sailing today on the S. S. Washington and for marriage next week in Bordeaux. They planned a brief honeymoon and return to America—to build the Orange home from the prize plans.

But Grace May Badaracco didn't sail today, and Paul Philip Le Bontilliere will never build the house in Orange.

His convalescence suddenly turned to pneumonia. He died yesterday at Bordeaux.
