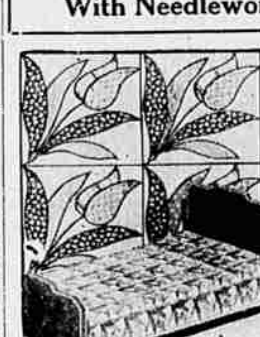

LAND BOUGHT FOR ROSEBURG SCHOOLS

Finlay Athletic Field to Be Enlarged by Use of Acquired Tract.

Completion of negotiations for purchase by the Roseburg district school board for 4.68 acres of land lying immediately west of Finlay athletic field from Roy Bellows was announced today. The school board plans to develop the field for athletic use, particularly for baseball, it was reported.

At present Finlay field cannot be used for baseball without removal of light poles and other changes which cause much expense and prevent the desired turning of the property for football purposes.

It is hoped that a WPA labor project can be obtained next fall to improve the newly acquired property. As soon as suitable provision is made for baseball it is planned to turn the present athletic field over to the school district. Expenses of the project, it is planned, will be paid from the percent taken by the school district from all athletic events held on the field.

Purchase of the property, which school board officials said was obtained at a very low price, was made with funds secured from sale of right of way to the highway department for the new route through the junior high school grounds.

OLE O. WEDVIG OF GARDINER PASSES

Ole Olson Wedvig, 79, well-known resident of Gardiner, died in Roseburg last night following a prolonged period of ill health. He was born July 2, 1858, at Wedvig, Norway, and for fifty or more years has been a resident of this county. No known relatives survive.

The body was taken to Gardiner this afternoon by the Douglas Funeral home, where funeral services were held. Interment followed in the Gardiner cemetery.
