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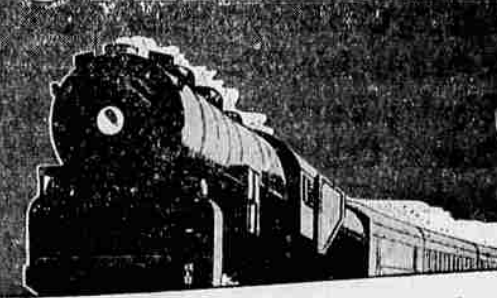

FAST TEMPO TELLS ON JACK DEMPSEY

Ex-Champ Showing Strain of Trying to Attend to Varied Interests.

NEW YORK, April 8.—(AP)—Jack Dempsey fast is becoming a very rich man. He quit the ring with over \$2,000,000 in cash and quick assets, and he's worth a lot more than that now. But he's beginning to look tired around the eyes and his friends are beginning to wonder how long the old mauler can maintain the terrific pace he's setting.

Recently a magazine writer wanted to do a piece entitled "A Day With Jack Dempsey." It took him three days to go the route and then three more days to recover. Jack, resting for a rare moment and talking with the writer, estimated he shakes 300 hands a day, year in and year out. He never gets a chance to work out any more.

He was asked why he didn't cut it out, or at least slow the tempo, and start in having some fun for himself. He admitted he and his comely wife, the former Hannah Williams, had been out by themselves only one evening in the last two years.

"I can't," he said. "These are tough times and a guy's got to keep punching. I've got to protect my investments. Take this restaurant. We've got \$500,000 sunk in it, and more than half of that is mine. We've got to do \$1,000 worth of business a day to break even."

And the restaurant is only one of Jack's interests. He also has a new bar a block away, and he figures he must spend several hours a day there, shaking more hands. He owns hotels in Los Angeles and Miami, and he has a piece of the Aqua Caliente race track. There's a new "Jack Dempsey" whiskey, and a "Jack Dempsey" magazine, and he is interested in a producing oil field at Gladewater, Texas.

Another man would delegate about two-thirds of the work to assistants, but Dempsey goes to the job as if he were losing punches at Jess Willard and didn't have a round to spare. He averages less than five hours sleep a night and attends some sort of benefit almost every day. Only an iron constitution, heritage of his lean days riding the rods and punching men around in the ring, keeps him on his feet.

The first thing the average handshaker asks Dempsey is what he thinks about that famous "long count" in his second bout with Gene Tunney at Chicago. Jack still thinks Tunney would have been a soft touch if he had managed to regain his feet 10 seconds after he hit the floor.

"That's an idea," Jack said to his right-hand man, Ned Brown. "Get Gene to write us a piece about that for the next edition of my magazine. Then I'll answer it."

JOCKEY RIDES SIX WINNERS IN ROW

SAN MATEO, Calif., April 8.—(AP)—Johnny Adams' feat of booting in six winning horses, five of them long shots, in succession at Bay Meadows track was listed today as one of the greatest records in American racing history.

The little jockey from Iola, Kas., the country's leading rider with 256 winners last year, rode Strident to third place in the first race and started his parade of winners in the third with Miss Amie, paying \$19.60.

Adams then piloted in Danke Schon at \$10, Rock at \$14, Dr. Spoon, \$16, Mousweep, \$16.80, and Undulazoon \$5.80.

Adams passed his rival for riding honors, Alan Gray, having steered in 22 winners in the 15 days of the meeting as against 29 for Gray. The day's work meant \$160 to Adams. He received \$30 for each winner and \$10 for bringing Strident in third.

Adams did not have a mount in the second race.

His feat was just one short of the American record, set by Joe Sylvester in 1926 when he rode in seven winners in one day at Havanna, Ohio.

Adams began riding three years ago despite assurances of everyone who knew anything about it that he hadn't the build for a jockey and didn't know how to ride.

The world's record for consecutive victories is held by England's Gordon Richards, who won 12 in a row in a three-day span in 1933.

The American record of nine in succession was set by Albert Adams in 1930, also over a three-day period.

LONDON, April 8.—(AP)—The Marquess of Milford Haven, 45, a cousin of the late King George V and elder brother of Lord Louis Mountbatten, died today after an illness of several weeks.

Like his brother, the marquess served for many years in the royal navy. He saw action in the World War in the naval battles of Jutland, Heligoland and Dogger bank. He was awarded the Russian order of St. Vladimir and the Italian order of Savoy for his services at Jutland.

He was married in 1916 to Nadejda, second daughter of the Grand Duke Michael of Russia. They had two children, a son David Michael, Earl of Nadejda, and a daughter Lady Elizabeth Tatiana.
