**G. O. P. TIDE RISING,
MRS. SCOTT REPORTS**Pro-America Visitor Here
Cites Prediction of Big
Gain in Congress.

Carrying tidings of progress and
increasing strength in republican
party ranks, Mrs. Quincy Scott,
addressing a meeting of Pro-America
at the Elks temple last evening,
stated that republican headquar-
ters in the east predict 180 seats in
the house of representatives in the
congress as the result of the forth-
coming election.

Mrs. Scott is completing a series of
meetings in the western part of
Oregon. Suggestions for policy
points are needed, she told the
gathering, and listed the following
points as those thus far presented
to the national organization by
Pro-America: 1. A sound financial
policy, restoration of government
credit and progress toward a bal-
anced budget. 2. Take the federal
government out of competition
with regular business. 3. Repeal of
the surplus and capital gains
taxes. 4. Return of the administra-
tion of relief to the states. 5. A pol-
icy of concentrating upon the
problem of better distribution
rather than upon the curtailment
of production. 6. Repeal or revision
of the Wagner labor relations act.
7. Moderate reasonable social se-
curity program on a pay as you go
basis from taxes. 8. Reorganization
of the government on a basis of
reducing cost and eliminating over-
lapping of bureaus under con-
gressional direction. 9. Protection
of industry, agriculture and labor

from competition with cheap for-
eign goods. 10. Return to the
American system of free initiative
and private enterprise with no
more class antagonism.

Mrs. Scott will meet with repub-
lican leaders in Salem this after-
noon to discuss campaign plans.

the audience of 800 persons he
would oppose labor gangsterism and
war.

ried 2,000 wounded and the ashes
of 1,000 dead, an indication of
Japanese casualties.

Chinese claims to victory about
Tachewang listed capture of 30
tanks, 300 machine-guns, 10,000
rifles and 77 artillery pieces. There
were 15,000 Japanese casualties,
Chinese asserted. If authenticated
this would be the greatest Chinese
victory of the war.
