HORNER FACTION WINNER IN ILLINOIS VOTE

Editorials ON THE Day's News

By FRANK JENKINS LAST Friday the house of representatives killed the bill to reorganize the government of the United States, which provided MORE power for the executive and LESS power for congress. That was a BIG event.

ON THE same day the people of seven Oregon counties defeated, two to one, a proposal to put government still more deeply into competition with private business. That was a small event.

IN THE first event, the members of the congress of the United States spoke. They said: "This must remain a government of law; and must not be permitted to become a government of men. We are THROUGH with being rubber stamps. We here and now reassume our constitutional function of making the laws as we see fit, and not as we are TOLD BY EDICT."

IN THE second event, the people of seven Oregon counties spoke. They said: "We have seen government forcing its way increasingly into competition with private business. The result has been loss of confidence in the future of business, with growing unemployment and depression. We are FEARFUL of this trend, and we here and now go on record as OPPOSED TO IT."

ROOSEVELT TO SUBMIT PLAN TO CONGRESS

Agreement on Outlay Of \$2,750,000,000 Reached at Conference, With Garner Absent.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt and his economic advisers worked at top speed today to complete a new recovery and relief program, apparently agreed upon at a lengthy night conference at the white house. While the conferees did not disclose details, it was indicated the keystone probably would be a proposal to spend \$1,500,000,000 on public works as a means of reviving business and industry.

LUCAS LEADS IGOE IN RACE FOR SENATOR

County Judge Jarecki Tops Prystalski in Primary Returns; Light Vote Cast by G. O. P.

CHICAGO, April 13.—(AP)—Scott W. Lucas, backed by Governor Horner's recently developed power in Illinois democratic politics, assumed a growing lead for the party's senatorial nomination today over Michael L. Igoe, adherent of the faction dominated by Mayor Edward J. Kelly and National Committee man Patrick A. Nash.

Lucas, serving his second term in the national house from the district of the late Speaker Henry T. Rainey, held a lead of 24,855 with 7,211 of the state's 8,286 precincts reported in yesterday's primaries. Igoe, United States district attorney at Chicago, scored heavily in the Cook county balliwick of Nash-Kelly forces, but the Havana congressman more than made up the difference in the "downstate" vote.

PARDON REQUESTED FOR DR. TOWNSEND

WASHINGTON, April 13.—(AP)—Senator McAdoo (D., Calif.) has asked President Roosevelt to pardon Dr. Francis E. Townsend, 80-year-old age pension advocate, who faces a 30-day jail term for contempt of a house committee.

LIFE TERMS GIVEN IN BATHTUB MURDER

SEATTLE, April 13.—(AP)—Life sentences were imposed yesterday by Superior Judge McDonnell on Dell and Claire Richardson, convicted in the "bathtub murder case." They were convicted of the slaying of Della's bride, the former Clara Compton of San Francisco, who died of pneumonia and a head injury last fall after submersion in a tub of scalding water.
