Within the Ranks

TO keep the record straight it should be noted that the defeat handed the president and new deal forces lately have not been republican party victories. The total of republican party members in this congress is so small that it has had, and can have, very little actual influence upon the decisions of that legislative body.

More than three times as many democrats voted against the supreme court bill than there were republican negative votes.

In the senate 26 democrats voted against the reorganization bill; 14 republicans voted against it.

When the reorganization bill was killed in the house by the ballot which sent it back to committee, 108 democrats voted against the bill as compared with the negative vote of only 88 republicans.

Practically all of the democrat members of congress were ardent with the administration during the first term of the new deal. Gradually, in spite of pressure, the drift away began. When the telegram and letter storm hit the House of Representatives just prior to the vote on the reorganization bill, the drift became a high tide.

What was lately thought a tendency may now be taken as a fact. Conservative democrats are no longer willing to ride along with the administration and follow white house dictates trustfully and blindly. There is a split in the ranks, and an opposition to the new deal and its current works, that the republican minority had no part in bringing about.

DATE FROM SPIRIT WORLD NOT FILLED

NEW YORK, April 13—(AP)—Joseph Dunninger, president of the universal council for psychic research, today announced the late Howard Thurston had failed thus far to keep a promise to return from the spirit world. Dunninger said he and five companions, all skeptics of psychic phenomena, had kept a vigil last night over a glass case containing an image of Thurston's death. Before Thurston's death, three years ago today, Dunninger explained, the magician gave him the image with a promise that he would return from the spirit world, break the glass case, and knock the image down. "We sat watching the glass case with its image for an hour," Dunninger said, "and nothing happened. It was the third year that we have done so."

CANCER INDUCED BY WHISTLE-TOOTING

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 13—(CP)—Dr. Frank R. Menne, University of Oregon medical school pathologist, said yesterday that whistle-tooting had increased the cancer incidence among police officers. "When the officers began using whistles, the cancer incidence among them increased considerably," Dr. Menne told a medical health league sponsored meeting, in explaining that repeated injury to tissue was one of the oldest theories of cancer cause. "There is no evidence to show cancer is contagious and no adequate proof that heredity is a factor," he concluded.

HOGAN SPEAKS ON REHABILITATION

Officer of D.A.V. Heard by Local Chapter; Auxiliary Is Reorganized.

At last night's meeting of the local "Dean Perrine" chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, Cicerio Hogan, rehabilitation officer of that organization, spoke to a large audience composed of veterans and their wives on the rehabilitation problems confronting the fast diminishing ranks of world war veterans. He cited records that world war veterans die at the rate of 87 daily and that many widows and veterans' children are left inadequately protected after the death of the men who gave their all in the defense of their country.

Refreshments were served after the meeting. Mrs. Josephine Ostrander, department commander of the ladies auxiliary, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, spoke briefly and proposed the reorganization of an auxiliary for "Dean Perrine" chapter. The motion was favorably received and acted upon immediately. Officers chosen for the ensuing year were: Commander, Mae Andrews; senior vice-commander, Esther Mills; junior vice-commander, Mildred White; adjutant, Lucille Gallin; chaplain, Harriet Wolfe; conductress, Morley Monger. Those appointed were: Historian, Nelle Cummings; patriotic instructor, Mrs. Roy Young; hospital chairman, Harriet Grouch; legislation rehabilitation chairman, Mrs. Roy Young; membership chairman, Mildred White. Mrs. Nelle Cummings, a past commander in the auxiliary, was appointed to the office of executive committee-woman. She was transferred from Salem unit. Mrs. Edward Lines was in attendance as a visitor.

Dr. Reynolds, state department commander predicted that Unit No. 9 would be the largest auxiliary in the state, inasmuch as the veterans facility here is the largest west of the Mississippi river. Many families will move here to be near their relatives, now patients at the facility, he said.

The state department of the auxiliary of which Mrs. Nelle Cummings is representative here, will furnish the favors and napkins for Easter at the facility.

The state and national officers present at the meeting expressed the hope that the state convention in 1939 would be held in Roseburg and conceded Roseburg an excellent chance of winning the vote at the state convention to be held at Bend, June 19 to 22.
