Lenten Devotions

THE CRUCIALITY OF THE CROSS

By J. R. TURNBULL

Dr. P. T. Forsyth says: "The great need of the world is a return to the Bible." A return to the Bible means a recognition not only of the centrality of the cross, but of its cruciality in experience. Because we have relegated our thinking of the cross and resurrection to our Lord to the so-called "Easter season." The cross is the great watershed of scripture; it is the focal-point of Old Testament truth; all the beams of New Testament truth radiate therefrom. The crucial event in the world's experience is expressed in 2 Cor. 5:19. "God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself." Reconciliation is one of those terms which stand for great vital truths; terms which have been largely emptied of their essential content by a specious rationalism; terms which are retained, because they are too valuable to lose; or because a philosophical interpretation of them seems to rescue them from what is alleged to be on old outworn theology.

1. The Cross was crucial to God. Sin disputed God's sovereignty. If God had no remedy for sin, His moral government would fail. But God smote sin a fatal blow at Calvary. "He put away sin by the sacrifice of Himself." God's faithfulness underwent a crucial test. His promises center in the cross. The cross fulfills His promises. God's love was also tested. Did He love the sinner enough to pay such a price for his salvation? The cross is the answer. His holiness was tested. Sin must be punished. Holiness demanded it. Christ "became sin for us," thus "bearing our sin in His own body on the tree." God can now both "be just and the justifier of Him that believeth."

2. The cross was crucial to Christ. It was the supreme test of His love for His Father; of His love for man; of all His claims; of His character.

3. The cross was crucial to the world. It is the crucial event in history; the greatest crisis because it is the event which must ultimately lead to the solution of all its problems, for it deals with that which lies at the root of all these—SIN. It was the test of its unity to God. It will be the ultimate basis of the judgment. Christ said the Holy Spirit would convict the world "of sin, because they believe not in Me."

3. The cross is crucial to the church. The blood is the life is not only a pathological fact, but a spiritual truth. The church's life depends on her Lord's death and resurrection. Without the cross, she has no hope, no power, no message.

4. The cross is crucial to the individual. It revolutionizes the life. It decides eternal destiny. It is not merely good advice, it is the "Good News" of life eternal.

The great message of "Good Friday" is "God was in Christ reconciling the world unto Himself."
