RAIL EXTENSION
PLAN IS HALTED

GRANTS PASS, April 14.—(AP)—Niel R. Allen, attorney for interests applying for extension of the California & Oregon Coast railroad, said today he had received forms for contemplated withdrawal of an application for extension of the line to Crescent City, Calif., now before the Interstate Commerce Commission.

He said that the forms had not yet been signed.

C. H. Demaray, receiver of the C. & O. C. said today he had been informed an application for extension of the municipally-financed line to Crescent City, Calif., had been withdrawn from the Interstate Commerce Commission without prejudice.

An unfavorable recommendation had already been made by an ICC examiner.

Demaray said he understood from Tom Price, engineer for Henry J. Kaiser of Oakland, Calif., Pacific coast contractor, that Kaiser still hoped eventually to renew the application, but probably with private financing instead of federal funds which had also been applied for.

Present financial distress of nearly all railroads was cited as inhibiting prospects of construction now.

CHILOQUIN THEFT
SUSPECT IS HELD

KLAMATH FALLS, April 14.—(AP)—Dale Willard, charged with burglary of the Chilquin postoffice March 24, was bound over to the federal grand jury yesterday after evidence introduced to link the 26-year-old Chilquin youth with the crime had been presented before U. S. Commissioner Thomas. Thomas raised Willard's bail from \$7500 to \$10,000.

Principal testimony was offered by State Police Sergeant O. A. Mackinnon, who said that over shoes assertedly lent Willard by Roy Hall, Chilquin barber, fitted tracks found in the snow over the rear door of the postoffice the night of the theft. Mackinnon also said one set of tracks led to the stairway of the Glenier apartments where Willard lived.

DEER RANGES SAID
OVER-POPULATED

KLAMATH FALLS, April 15.—(AP)—Winter deer ranges along the California-Oregon line are 35 per cent over-populated, Dr. H. A. Shantz, chief of wild life management for the United States forest service, told Lakeview and Klamath Falls audiences.

He asserted lack of adequate food for the winter concentration of deer had increased danger of wholesale deaths in the next severe winter.

He suggested reduction of the deer population through temporary lifting of restrictions protecting does.

HEAVY STOCKING
OF FISH REPORTED

Welcome news to the army of fishermen, which numbers more than ten per cent of the population, is the report of 1937 fish stocking, announced this week for the 20 national forests of Oregon and Washington. In Oregon national forests more than 16,800,000 fry and fingerlings were planted by state and other agencies in lakes and streams within forest boundaries. In addition more than 300,000 fry and fingerlings were planted in Oregon by the U. S. forest service in less accessible waters.

Outthroat, rainbow, and eastern brook trout were most numerous of the species planted, through steelhead, sockeye salmon, chinook and silver salmon. Montana black spotted trout, silver trout, and Loch-leven trout also were among the species stocked.

In Oregon the Deschutes national forest took the lead in fish stocking with 7,700,000 fish planted. The Siuslaw national forest took second place, showing 3,200,000 fingerlings planted, including a number of young chinook salmon.
