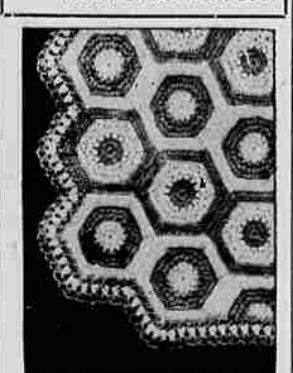
MINSTREL SHOW IS PRESENTED AT SUTHERLIN
