Miss Evelyn Galla assisted Mrs. Conn in serving.

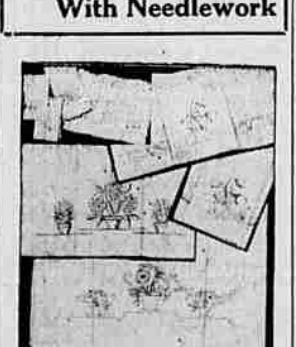
EASTERN STAR MEMBERS GIVE EASTER PARTY
