ABOLISHMENT OF
IDLE GOLD ORDERED

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP)—The treasury abolished today the "inactive gold fund" created Dec. 24, 1936, to stem inflation effect of huge imports of foreign gold.

The fund already was empty because President Roosevelt last week ordered the \$1,152,000,000 worth of gold in the "sterile" account used for currency to help pay the cost of his new spending program and to expand the supply of bank credit available to business.

Secretary Morgenthau explained the treasury was abandoning any commitment to sterilize gold, but specifically denied he was abandoning the principle of sterilization—the process of segregating gold and paying for it with borrowed money which prevents the influx of metal from adding to bank funds.

To the extent that incoming gold is not sterilized, it will swell the lendable funds of the banks but will not affect treasury finances because the metal would be paid for with currency issued upon the gold.

BILLS THEFT WAIVES

MEFORD, Ore., April 19.—(AP)—Passing of sentence upon Mrs. Bessie Clawson, 47, Ashland

housewife, who entered a plea of guilty to larceny of \$200 belonging to her niece, Mrs. Wanda Works, of Talent, was deferred today by Circuit Judge Norton, pending an interview by the court with the defendant's husband, a Southern Pacific railroad engineer, stationed in Klamath Falls.

In a signed statement read in court, Mrs. Clawson admitted taking the money from its hiding place and turning her home topsy-turvy to leave the impression a burglary had been committed. The money in \$50 bills, was later traced to Mrs. Clawson, and the most of it returned, the district attorney said. The offense occurred April 5 last.
