Sealed proposals for furnishing labor and materials required for the full completion of broad portion at the Rock Creek Hatchery, Douglas County, Oregon, for the Oregon State Game Commission, will be opened by the Oregon State Board of Control at the State Office building, Salem, Oregon, at 2 p. m., May 2, 1938.

A certified check or bidder's bond must accompany the proposal for construction in the amount of ten per cent of the total bid payable to the Oregon State Board of Control to guarantee that the bidder will enter into a contract and execute the required bond.
