## Record-Size Cake, Product of Roseburg Baker, to Be Served at Henninger's Mart



A 200-pound tomato soup cake, claimed to be the largest of its kind ever baked, is on display today at Weber's bakery, waiting to be served Saturday to patrons at Henninger's Mart.

Measuring 84 by 29 inches in size, the cake contains 42 pounds of sugar, 7 pounds of butter, 7 dozen eggs, 86 cans of tomato soup, 10 ounces of soda, 42 pounds of cake flour, 2 ounces of nutmeg, 2 ounces of mace, 2 ounces of cloves and 16 pounds of honey dipped raisins. The cake required 30 pounds of icing.

It was mixed and baked at Weber's bakery by Maurice Weber. The cake will be displayed at Henninger's Mart, starting at 10 a. m. Friday.

The first cutting and serving of the cake will start at 11 a. m. Saturday, and serving will continue as long as the cake lasts.

The popular Mart is inviting all its patrons and friends to inspect the cake and to be present when it is cut.

## FRUIT CROPS HURT LESS THAN FEARED

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—The weather bureau reported today that damage to fruit crops by freezing weather the last week does not appear either as severe or extensive as first feared. Losses were confined generally, it said, to early peaches, cherries, plums and grapes in central states, parts

of Texas and locally in the Appalachian mountain region.

Except for small sections in Montana and the Dakotas, the drought which has plagued the great plains region for several years appears to have ended, the bureau said.

## MINORITY ASSAILS WAGE-HOUR BILL

WASHINGTON, April 20.—(AP)—A minority of the house labor committee, criticizing the revised wage-hour bill as "arbitrary and discriminatory," predicted today the supreme court would invalidate it if it became law.

Representative Ramspeck (D., Ga.) issued the dissenting report.

The new measure would provide for a graduated minimum wage starting at 25 cents an hour and increasing to 40 cents at the end of three years. Work hours would drop from 44 to 40 a week in two years.

The Ramspeck report said that while it may be contended the revised bill is not discriminatory because it provides for uniform wages and hours, "when those figures are translated into actual wages in terms of what the dollars will buy, it will be found that the proposal does not provide uniformity in that respect."

"The bill favored by the majority delegates the right in the secretary of labor to determine what industries shall be affected which seems to be an unwise if not actually an illegal delegation to a single officer in the executive branch of the government."

"To impose a rigid inflexible wage in all parts of the United States will consequently mean that some employers cannot longer compete in the eastern market where a majority of our consumers reside. That means, therefore, retirement from business, and their employees, instead of having their wages raised, will find themselves on relief."
