## PILLSBURY GRAIN ELEVATOR BURNS

MINNEAPOLIS, April 21.—(AP) Fire today destroyed the 55-year-old Pillsbury elevator with loss estimated at between \$350,000 and \$500,000. Approximately half a million bushels of wheat, barley and rye were destroyed. The structure was 13 stories high and was owned by the Andrews Grain company. Night Watchman George Frost, who discovered the fire, said it might have started from overheated machinery.
