

CRIPPLED CHILDREN AID PLAN LAUNCHED

A state plan for benefit of crippled children has recently been inaugurated by the state relief committee, designated by law as the official state agency to administer this aid, according to word received by the Douglas county relief committee, Franklin Voyt, executive secretary, reported today.

The state of Oregon through the state relief committee and the U. S. children's bureau of the department of labor participate financially on an equal basis in the administration of the Oregon plan, from funds derived through the social security act and the state relief committee.

The program is limited to residents of Oregon who are under 16 years of age. Medical treatment will be restricted to individuals in economic distress.

The types of crippling conditions that will be eligible for care are: defects in children of apparently normal functions of bones, muscles or joints; congenital or due to disease or accident; aggravated by disease, neglect or ignorance, including cleft palate, hare lip or other plastic conditions.

Cases of this nature are requested to register at the staff office of the Douglas county relief committee at the courthouse, Roseburg. Physicians are requested to report congenital malformations and birth injuries in family groups which would be eligible because of the economic distress factor. The Douglas county health unit will cooperate in planning for all eligible cripple cases which are so registered.

PUD FINANCE PLAN TO BE INITIATED

An initiative measure to provide a revenue plan of financing for people's utility districts will be sponsored by the Oregon State Grange executive committee, Fred A. Goff, member of that committee, reported today upon his return from a meeting held yesterday at Portland. Under the present state law, Mr. Goff reports, provision is made only for financing power and other types of utility districts by direct bond issue, thereby imposing liability upon real property. The proposed new law which the grange executive committee will sponsor, would permit issuance of certificates of indebtedness against the physical properties of the utility district, eliminating real property from liability.

PORTLAND, April 21—(AP)—

George W. Joseph of Portland, chairman of the state hydro-electric commission, said today the status of scattered sections which favored a people's power district in the seven-county election would probably be submitted to the attorney general for a decision.

Because no similar problem has arisen in the past the commission has not determined either its power or jurisdiction.

EARTHQUAKE'S TOLL IN TURKEY MOUNTS

ANKARA, Turkey, April 21—(AP)—The Anatolia earthquake toll of dead and missing soared to at least 800 today after a night of continuing shocks which 50,000 homeless spent in mad terror.

Terrific underground rumblings were accompanied by intermittent earthshocks over a wide area of western Asia bordering the Aegean Sea.

Panic-stricken refugees fled from crevices full of boiling water. Eighteen villages were utterly destroyed, and 22 others were badly damaged.

Whole families were buried under mountainous debris. Most of the victims were women and children.

S. C. MEREDITH TAKEN BY DEATH

FRANKING VIOLATOR FACES \$280 CLAIM

WASHINGTON, April 21—(AP)—Post office officials said today they would ask Horace Russell, assigned general counsel for the home owners loan corporation, to pay approximately \$280 in postage charges for letters he sent out under the franking privilege, praising the legal abilities of O. B. Taylor, a former H. O. L. C. attorney.

Russell resigned his government post Tuesday after Rep. Church (R., Ill.) asserted on the floor of the house that the H. O. L. C. attorney had franked "more than a million" praising Taylor.

Russell Black, assistant postmaster general in charge of mailing privileges, said Russell mailed approximately 9,600 frank letters which ordinarily would require approximately \$280 postage.

Black said postal officials would make no decision about taking legal action against Russell until Postmaster General Farley returns to the capital next week.

Misuse of the government franking privilege is subject to a fine upon conviction, of not to exceed \$300 for each letter mailed.

Tax Measure Coming

north bank in Shansi and Hounan provinces. Japanese have been unable to effect a crossing. Chinese, with widely separated daily engagements, forced Japanese to maintain large garrisons to keep control of communication lines.

Wuhu—After several months of exploratory drives from Nanking, Japanese have penetrated to Lankang, 40 miles up river, while Chinese hold the opposite bank. Rising waters now make Chinese and Japanese positions inalienable and swamps as the rainy season comes on.

Hwai river—The Japanese advance northward from Nanking along the Tientsin-Pukow railway toward Suchoo was stalled. Chinese continued sporadic attacks. Reports indicated Japanese reinforcements, however, might aid the Lini drive from the north.

Hanchow—A Japanese garrison estimated at 20,000 has been held up since its occupation of this support southwest of Shanghai on Christmas eve. Chinese, drawn up in a half moon 20 miles from the

ever, they agreed the situation had changed. Despite the opposition of such democrats as Byrd and Glass of Virginia to Mr. Roosevelt's works proposals, the program at this time appears certain of congressional approval.

Thus the republicans are considering going out in the front of the opposition. Senator Austin (R., Va.) said in an interview:

"I have no doubt that the republican party is going to run up its flag in this fight. It seems hopeless that enough democrats will join the opposition to do anything about the program."

The point of republican attack will be against congressional authorization of public works. There were prospects, however, that some republican votes would be recorded for the public works program.

It was generally believed the republicans would support a \$1,250,000,000 appropriation for relief for the seven months beginning July 1, but would insist that the administration of relief be given over to the states. A bill along that line has already been introduced in the house by Representative Bacon (R., N. Y.).
