The Mental Hygiene Problem

Nearly 60 per cent of all hospital beds in the United States are occupied by patients suffering from one form or another of mental disease. About 200,000 persons are thus afflicted and the new cases developed annually number about 125,000.

The care of this large group of patients costs \$271,000,000 a year and the annual economic loss, statisticians say, amounts to slightly more than a billion dollars. These figures show the size of the mental hygiene problem.

During the last 50 years we have become increasingly aware of the challenge of mental disease. In 1880 there were 816 persons in mental hospitals per 100,000 population. Now the hospitals admit 308 per 100,000 for mental disease—almost four times the 1880 figure.

But there is no warrant for concluding from these figures that the ratio of those mentally sick to those in good health has substantially increased since 1880. It is more likely that the mental health of the community has not changed, but that more of those who are sick are brought into institutions for treatment.

Certain phases of the mental health problem are definitely understood and intensive efforts are being made to deal with them. Thus, syphilis is responsible for about 10 per cent of mental disorders. The elimination of syphilis will relieve us of that portion of the burden and probably more, for the syphilis bacterium, physical degeneration and is also responsible for a good deal of mental feebleness.

Over-indulgence in alcohol accounts for about 9 per cent of the first admissions to New York state hospitals for the mentally ill—probably a fair example of nationwide experience. The alcohol phase of the mental hygiene problem is, at least in theory, subject to elimination.

Mental cases which may be attributed to the specific poisons encountered in industry, and to abuse of drugs are not very significant numerically, but they too can be substantially reduced or not entirely eliminated.

The mental disorders associated with anility are also likely to be reduced when we learn to control and retard excessive physical disintegration.
