PARIS.—The smartest afternoon ensembles combine the chic simplicity of day-time frocks with the glamor and feminine allure of evening clothes. This is the year of years to splurge a bit on the outfit you buy for tea, important luncheons, informal dinners.

Whether you are looking for a dress with a long coat which can do double duty, or hesitating between another suit—skip this time—or a dress and jacket two piece, this is merely a matter for your pocketbook and your summer wardrobe requirements. All are featured among the new styles and all are smart.

SKIRTS ARE SHORT AND VERY NARROW

In any case, whether a dress is topped by a long, three-quarters or wristlength coat, the same general rules apply: skirts are short, shorter than last season and narrow, but not too exaggerated. Fullness, when featured, is massed in front, apronwise, while some skirts are pleated, allaround or in front only. Bodices offer the necessary contrast with their molding draperies and high neckline—at the base of the throat—and the waistline is always stressed in some way or other, sometimes to hourglass dimensions.

The leading houses all report that the majority of their smart clients have ordered at least one navy blue outfit for afternoon wear, which would tend to show that it is running a close second to black, if not superseding it for dressup occasions.

At Molyneux, the ensemble with diagonal diamond check in navy blue on white silk crepe for the dress, with entirely pleated skirt and plain, high bodice, topped with a long coat in navy, is one of the most successful numbers with private clients. The coat is straight and fastens with the new metal clips. It has three-quarter sleeves and four pockets.

RED, WHITE AND BLUE FOR BLOUSE COLORS

Polka dots are running stripes a very close race in the afternoon picture. Many suits at Mainbocher's are completed by the long, tunic blouse in dotted foulard or surah combined with dark skirt and jacket. Red and white or porcelain blue and white with navy or black are smart. Mainbocher also shows an entire suit in dotted foulard navy and white for the skirt and jacket, with the blouse in red and white. This has been ordered several times, as well as in two shades of green and white.

Delicate lingerie blouses, with lace insertions and pin-tucks, are another natural complement to this type of afternoon suit. And chiffon in white or a contrasting pastel shade also fashions some very smart and ultra-feminine blouses offsetting the severity of the suit itself.
