nor is a member of the honorary committee, which has President Roosevelt as its head. In 1937 forty-three of these governors issued proclamations or gave out public statements urging participation by their citizens. Two hundred newspapers published unsolicited editorials. National Music week is truly a people's celebration.

"The 1938 observance coincides with the 100th anniversary of the introduction of music into the public schools of this country, by Lowell Mason, in Boston, Mass. Many communities are paying tribute to the pioneer work of this New England educator, as a feature of their music week participation."

"Campaigns for the development of musical opportunities for young people in the post-school years are also being undertaken in towns and cities in which there is little outlet for musical ability in amateur orchestras, bands, and choral groups. In some of the rural communities this work is being organized on a county-wide basis. In promoting it, the national music week committee is cooperating with the committee on music in social life of the music educators national conference."
