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An Authority Writes

A NOTED authority on hunting and fishing, Tod Powell, who conducts "The Woodman" department for the San Francisco Chronicle, in his column April 10 discussed western commercial fishing and after dealing with the situation on the Columbia said of the Umpqua:

"In our prelude comment to the Bonneville dam situation, we give the commercial salmon fishermen their break as far as this editor is concerned, and then with our thought as to the sportsmen we follow downstate in Oregon, where for many years the sportsmen have had a break in many conditions in regard to fish and game, to realize that the great state to our north has been sadly remiss as to the value of its sporting economy in permitting the commercial interests to make an inexcusable blot on its map with its permission to allow commercial netmen to make a non-game fish out of the steelhead which enter the Umpqua river.

"Without any doubt in our mind, this stream is the greatest sport stream in the continental United States—at least, it should be, if it were properly preserved. The upper Umpqua has no problems as to mining or irrigation as have other large steelhead streams of the coast, but the deplorable condition remains that of 17 miles of nets near its mouth, which in their positions almost preclude a run of the fine game fish to their spawning grounds, have practically denuded it of game fish life.

"The canning of steelhead at the mouth of the Umpqua cannot possibly be compared to the great revenue possible from the sport fishing at the upper reaches of the fine stream. And the paradoxical situation in Oregon seems to be that the steelhead of its well known Rogue river are legally termed game fish, while the same fish of the Umpqua are merely fish which may be canned the same as salmon.

"California sportsmen who would spend thousands of dollars for sport on the Umpqua cannot understand this, and we cannot understand why such fine sportsmen, as Aaron Frank and others in their fine state should tolerate such a condition.

"The upper Umpqua, lacking mining and irrigation problems, should be made and perpetuated the anglers' paradise of the United States."

NATIONAL LEAGUE SEES 3 SHUTOUTS

Dizzy Dean Pitches One of Day's Blanks for Cubs Against Old Mates.

National league pitchers evidently are beginning to take a liking to that now ball with its slightly raised seams. In four games yesterday they turned in a series of remarkable performances, Schumacher, of the Giants showing the way with a one-hit, 1 to 0 victory over Brooklyn's Dodgers.

The only hit off Schumacher was by the first man to face him at Ebbets field. It was a dinky roller past first base by Rosen, Brooklyn rookie. Thereafter only three reached first on the Giants, right-hander, all on walks.

Meantime, Van Mungo of the Dodgers was doing all right, himself. He gave 10 hits, but it took Ott's home run in the second inning to beat him.

MacPhayden of the Boston Bees produced a three-hit gem in blanking the Phillies, 2 to 0. Just before game time he had been advised of the death of his foster father, but insisted upon pitching.

Dizzy Dean gave a little additional proof that he isn't going to do the Chicago Cubs any material harm as he shut out his old chums, the St. Louis Cardinals, 5 to 0, on four hits. The great one had only a single strikeout, but he looked a lot like his old self.

Chicago fans to the number of 34,520 turned out to see their new \$250,000 beauty, and Dizzy didn't disappoint them. His curve which is wider than in other years, had the Cards swinging frantically. To top it off, he singled for one of the Cubs' eight blows off Max Macon, a youngster making his first big league start.

The Cub players rushed to congratulate Diz after the final out, and thousands of fans waited outside the gate to glimpse him. He told autograph seekers, modestly: "Only 25 more wins to go."

Pirates Stay at Top
Tobin kept the undefeated Pirates tearing along at the head of the procession as he bested Peaches Davis of Cincinnati, 2 to 1, in a brilliant duel. He allowed five hits; Davis six. The Pirates were due for some tougher competition as they opened a series with the Cubs today.

Cleveland climbed into the American league lead with its fifth straight triumph and third in a row over Detroit, 9 to 4. Feller, who hurled a one-hit shut-out in his first start of the season, came back to hold the Tigers to three safeties and no runs for the first eight innings. They popped him five times in the ninth to break his scoreless string.

Yanks Nose Out Solons
Even with DiMaggio still out of the lineup, the Yankees showed some of their old-time spunk in defeating Washington, 4 to 3. Trailing into the eighth, they filled the bases and the tying and winning runs on a lazy grounder that the Senator infield failed to convert into a double play.

The St. Louis Browns nosed out Chicago, 4 to 3, in the last of the ninth after the White Sox had rallied in their half to score three times and chase Walkup from the hill.

The Philadelphia Athletics finally broke into the win column by beating four Boston rookie pitchers for 14 hits and a 10 to 4 victory. Bob Johnson of the A's hit his third home run of the season.

OPEN MEETING SET BY SKI DEVOTEES

Final Plans for Organizing Winter Sports Group to Be Discussed Here.

Roseburg and Douglas county's newly formed ski club, which had its inception less than two months ago, will hold its second open meeting Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock in the circuit court room at the courthouse. At this time final plans for the organization of the winter sports group will be discussed and the new constitution, formulated by the board of directors elected at the first meeting, will be presented for approval and adoption by the members.

The meeting is open to the general public and especially those interested in seeing winter sports developed in this area. Much interest has been shown by individuals and civic groups concerning the organization of the new ski club and a large turnout is expected.

The board of directors, consisting of Ernest Unrath president pro tem, Carmel Newland secretary-treasurer, and E. A. Britton, Alvin Knudtson, George Churchill, Ralph Church, Edward Smith and Maynard Bell, have been busy the past month with the organization plans and all details incident to the formation of a winter sports club and report everything in readiness for tomorrow night's meeting.

Skiing Site Chosen
Roseburg is one of the few remaining metropolitan areas which has lagged in the developing of winter sports and it is the purpose of the new group to remedy the situation by developing the proposed Red Butte ski area which is less than 10 miles from Roseburg via the Little river road. According to reports an average of 4 feet of snow will be available for skiing for more than 4 months out of the year. The ski club is working in cooperation with local forest officials since the proposed ski site is located within the bounds of the Umpqua national forest.

In order that the general public may best understand the idea behind the formation of such a group, this article from the new constitution is presented: "The purposes of this organization are: to promote and establish Douglas county as a resort for outdoor sports, especially skiing and sports incident thereto; to encourage the patronage and development thereof; in order that the same may be a tourist asset to the state of Oregon and the winter playground of Douglas county; to develop the physical and mental capacities of its members and others by outdoor winter sports and exercises, especially among young people; to provide facilities and equipment for the enjoyment and participation in winter sports; to at all times operate the said corporation without profit to said corporation or to the members thereof."

LOS ANGELES STAYS AT TOP OF LEAGUE

Leaders Lose, However, in Twin Bill; Sactos and Ducks Go 14 Frames.

Los Angeles, although beaten twice by San Diego, was still in first place in the Pacific Coast baseball league today because Portland-Sacramento played 14 innings to a 7-to-7 tie.

By defeating Los Angeles 8 to 7 and 3 to 1 in the seven-inning nightcap yesterday, San Diego took the series 4 games to 3 and moved from seventh to sixth place. Oregon knocked the apple off of the lot at Portland to give Sacramento a 3 to 2 win over Portland in the opener. The second game was lit for fat with darkness winning the decision with the score 7 all. It left the two teams tied for second place.

Oakland, which had a hard time convincing fans it was playing in the Coast league, won five out of seven games last week, and climaxed its performance by a double win over Seattle yesterday, both by a 4 to 2 score. The Oaks still remained in the cellar, but the Seattle team was a scant game ahead in seventh place.

The Hollywood Stars measured the San Francisco Seals, 3 to 2, in the opener and 6 to 3 in the nightcap, but lost the series, four games to three.

Oregon won his third game of the series for the Sacramento team over Portland with his homer in the seventh to break a 2 to 2 deadlock. Cronin of the Beavers hit a homer in the fifth in the same game.

There were 35 base hits pounded out in the 14-inning marathon, the Beavers outkicking the Seals, 18 to 17. There were three homers apiece by Cullop and Barton of Sacramento and the other by Fredericks of Portland.
