AAA PROGRAM WILL MEET LAW CHANGES

The Agricultural Adjustment Administration today announced that details of the 1938 agricultural conservation program have been changed to put that phase of this year's AAA farm program in line with recent amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938.

Important among the amendments to the AAA of 1938, which were approved by the president April 7, were those which authorized increases in the cotton acreage allotments for certain farms for which adequate allotments were not available under the original apportionment. The amendments also provided that no rate of payment in connection with soil-depleting crops should be less than 50 per cent of rates listed when the program originally was announced last October 22. Further amendments were designed to clarify language of the Farm Act and simplify its administration.

For potatoes in the early producing area, the rate per bushel, at a farm's average yield, on acreage planted up to a farm's allotment has been raised from 4 cents a bushel to 5 cents. For late potatoes, the rate has been raised from 3 cents to 3.6 cents.

All of the new rates for three crops are 50 per cent of the rates originally provided in the 1938 program. They had been reduced after passage of the agricultural adjustment act of 1938 provided a formula for dividing payments among crops which reduced amounts available for potatoes and the two types of tobacco.

A number of other changes largely clarifying in nature have been made in the 1938 program.

EATS HARDWARE TO DODGE DEATH CHAIR

MISSING, N. Y., April 25.—(AP)—By eating pieces of bed spring and nuts and bolts, John Rykowski, 25-year-old house painter, nearly choked the Sing Sing prison electric chair.

Rykowski is awaiting execution for the fatal shooting of Mrs. Louisa Walto, 59, and a visitor, Miss Joan Schuchman, 19, at Elmhurst, Long Island, on January 12. Saturday, he became ill in the death house and was taken to the prison hospital for an operation. "I found pieces of bed spring

and a large quantity of wire in his stomach, as well as a couple of handfuls of nuts and bolts," said Dr. Charles Sweet.

He said Rykowski probably would recover.

WOMAN THROWS SELF UNDER TRAIN

PORTLAND, April 25.—(AP)—Matilda Granquist, about 50, was instantly killed today when struck by a Spokane, Portland and Seattle passenger train near St. Johns.

Deputy Coroner Crabtree said the engineer reported the woman was standing on the station platform and he allowed his train thinking she was a passenger, but speeded up again as she turned and walked along the tracks.

As the engine approached, the engineer said, the woman threw her coat over her head and threw herself under the wheels.

Crabtree said Mrs. Granquist, who leaves a husband and two children, returned from the state hospital at 9 o'clock Sunday.

BRIDE, 12, TAKEN FROM HUSBAND, 37

GEORGETOWN, Del., April 25.—(AP)—A 12-year-old girl who became a bride eleven days ago was separated Saturday from her 37-year-old husband and sent to the state industrial school for girls.

Almira Mae McChesney, weeping bitterly, was taken immediately to the school at Clayton at the close of a hearing before Judge Willey on a charge of having violated her parole.

Her husband, a fisherman, returned to the home in Lewes, where Almira cooked his meals and kept house before school authorities, investigating the girl's absence, discovered the marriage.

The judge told the child: "I wish you could live with Samuel McChesney. But the law forbids the marriage of a girl your age. The minimum age for marriage in this state is 16 years."

Almira, who will be 13 next Saturday, was placed in the custody of the court at the age of nine when she was arrested for mutilating gravestones in a churchyard. She was paroled to the custody of her mother last March.

IZAAK WALTONITES SET FORTH DESIRES

CHICAGO, April 25.—(AP)—Cotto C. Doering of Chicago was elected president of the Izaak Walton League of America Saturday at the final session of the annual convention.

Vice-presidents elected included William L. Finley, of Portland, Ore.

Resolutions adopted by the convention at its closing session recommended establishment of a national father-and-son fishing week support of conservation work in the schools, support of sound bill 23, introduced by Senator Royal S. Copeland, controlling possession of firearms; support of a great fisheries treaty between the United States and Canada; preservation of the primeval condition of the national parks; restriction of grazing; approval of works progress administration and consideration of preservation of "existing natural values of water" prior to authorization for dams or other works for power, irrigation, navigation, drainage, flood control or any purely utilitarian use.

ECKENER WILL ASK U. S. FOR HELIUM

BERLIN, April 25.—(AP)—Dr. Hugo Eckener plans to sail for the United States next Thursday to convince Washington officials the helium he has been endeavoring to buy will not be used for military purposes.

"There must be a misunderstanding somewhere," Dr. Eckener said. "I hope to be able to remove any misapprehensions and give satisfactory replies to any questions put to me."

"All military experts are agreed that lighter-than-air craft, even filled with helium, cannot possibly be used for military purposes under conditions obtaining in Europe."

In Washington yesterday Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes said he was hesitant to authorize helium sales in Germany without assurances the gas would not be used as an "instrument of war."

JUDGE WM. CAKE DIES IN PORTLAND

PORTLAND, April 25.—(AP)—Judge William Cake, 76, long active in legal, republican and 75th federal circles here, died Sunday after an illness of six weeks.

Judge Cake was city attorney from 1896 to 1898 and county judge from 1898 to 1902. He was a former state chairman of the republican party.

PIRATES HANG UP 7TH STRAIGHT WIN

Cubs Beaten by 8-6 Score; Cardinals Suffer 3rd Shutout in Row.

It might not be a bad idea to begin taking the Pittsburgh Pirates very seriously in the current National league race. Their seventh straight win was scored yesterday at the expense of the Chicago Cubs by a score of 8 to 6. That put them a full game in front of the second-place New York Giants, who were held idle by rain at the Polo grounds.

What makes the opening burst of the Pirates bear more weight is the fact that they've taken up right where they left off last season, when they closed with 10 straight victories. They're getting consistently good pitching and the batting has been hot and timely.

Twice yesterday the Pirates exploded four-run rallies to overtake and pass the Cubs, the second time in the eighth inning.

Cardinals Hit Cellar.

The St. Louis Cardinals took it on the chin again in the only other National league contest and gained unrivaled possession of the basement. Derringer, pitching his second victory for Cincinnati, held the Birds to three hits. They got four the day before off Dixie Dean. The score of their third straight shutout was 5 to 0.

Still clubbing feebly, the New York Yankees bowed to the Philadelphia Athletics, 6 to 1. All of the champions' seven hits off Ross were singles, and the great Lou Gehrig went hitless again. Lodi, the A's rookie second baseman from Oakland, posted the home run and two singles off Hughes.

Gehrig now has a grand total of one hit 24 official trips to the plate, and the fans are beginning to wonder if the veteran first baseman at last has lost his eye. Any other Yankee in a similar slump would have been pulled before this, but Manager McCarthy is loath to break Lou's long record for continuous playing. The done now is that Joe DiMaggio will be back in the line-up Thursday, and many believe his presence will bring Gehrig back to life.

Ostermuller Hurls Blank.

Lefty Ostermuller pitched the Boston Red Sox into second place in the American, blanking Washington 7 to 0 with four hits. Lefty looked like the pitching help Joe Cronin was crying for. In his first appearance last week he allowed the Yankees only one blow in six innings. The Sox jumped on Dutch Leonard yesterday for nine hits, including a double and two singles by Ben Chapman.

Detroit's sluggers finally found themselves and pounded out a 10 to 1 win over three St. Louis Browns pitchers. It was the Tigers' second triumph in seven starts, and they felt some better today. Vernon Kennedy won his first game for the Tigers, holding the Browns to eight bingles.

The league-leading Cleveland Indians were broken out at Chicago.

BILL LILLARD TOPS BATTERS OF WEEK

PORTLAND, April 26.—(AP)—Bill Lillard of San Francisco led Pacific Coast league batters last week with a .438 average. Spencer Harris, outfielder for the San Diego Padres, took second position with .397.

Two Portland Beavers were in third and fourth places. Manager Bill Sweeney, first base, hit at a .375 clip and Johnny Fredericks, outfielder, at .370.

The Beavers topped the team hitting with an average of .291. San Francisco held second place with .287.

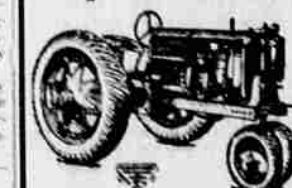
HUGE SHARK KILLED WITH POCKET KNIFE

LONDON, April 26.—(AP)—A 26-foot "sea gangster"—a shark with a mouth as big as an automobile wheel—has been killed with a pocket knife by a fisherman in Weymouth bay.

The huge two-ton shark had been wrecking fishermen's nets for more than three years, and eluding hunting parties armed with rifles and harpoons.

WALLACE GIVEN HIGH COURT JOLT

WASHINGTON, April 25.—(AP)—The supreme court coupled a verbal spanking for Secretary Wallace today with a notice that "multiplying" federal agencies must act "in accordance with the cherished judicial tradition embodying the basic concepts of fair play."

Speaking through Chief Justice Hughes, the court invalidated a 1933 order by Wallace reducing maximum fees that could be collected at the Kansas City stockyards by agents buying and selling livestock on a commission basis.

Hughes said that Wallace's acceptance for his own of the findings of other officials, without giving the agents a "reasonable opportunity" to contest them, "is more than an irregularity in practice; it is a vital defect."

The court added that "maintenance of proper standards" was "of the highest importance if these multiplying agencies deemed as necessary in our complex society are to serve the purposes for which they are created and endowed with vast powers."
