

N. Y. TIES PIRATES FOR LEAGUE LEAD

Homer With Bases Loaded off Larry French Beats Chicago Cubs.

The New York Yankees were in a dead heat with Pittsburgh today for the leadership of the National league, with eight wins and a single loss.

In swamping the Phillies twice yesterday, 7 to 3 and 11 to 6, the Giants pummeled a total of 27 hits, in the seventh inning of the second game they put over six runs on five solid smacks, including home runs by Leiber and Moore.

Pittsburgh prevented the Giants from taking full possession of the lead by defeating the Chicago Cubs, 6 to 5. Vaughan, Pirate shortstop, supplied the winning margin when he hit the jackpot in the seventh inning—a home run with the bases loaded. Larry French was his victim.

The Brooklyn snapped a four-game losing streak by belting four Boston Bee twirlers for 17 hits and a 13 to 2 victory.

Warneke brought the St. Louis Cardinals out of their prolonged slump with a 5 to 0 shutout of Cincinnati, in which he gave up only three hits.

Cleveland's Indians remained on top in the American league, although they suffered their first defeat since opening day at the hands of the Chicago White Sox, 6 to 3. The Sox jumped on Harder for four runs after two were out in the seventh. Thornton Lee became the first Sox pitcher to last the limit this year.

The Yankees finally won two in a row at the expense of Philadelphia 9 to 2, and their 16 hits would indicate that the champions are at last finding the range. Ruffing stopped the A's cold after the seeing inning, when Rookie Lodigiani hit a homer with one on. Joe DiMaggio was expected to add his big bat to the swelling Yankee chorus when the Yanks faced the Red Sox today at the stadium.

Deahing pitched the surprising Washington Senators into second place with a 5 to 2 performance over Boston.

The St. Louis Browns gave Detroit a 7 to 2 beating. Newsom hurled his third complete game and his third straight victory and set the Tigers down with four fatalities.

FRESH NAZI ORDER STRIKES AT JEWS

BERLIN, April 27.—(AP)—Jews must register without delay their fortunes and properties at home and abroad, under a decree issued today by Field Marshal Goering, Nazi Germany's No. 2 man, as director of Germany's four-year plan to attain economic independence.

The decree stipulates that all German Jews must register and evaluate their entire German and foreign possessions, provided they exceed 5,000 marks (\$2,000).

Fortunes under 5,000 marks are exempted. Foreign Jews living in Germany must register their German possessions.

At the same time, the decree provides that sale or rent of Jewish business undertakings, farms or forest preserves must be reported to authorities.

Establishment of new Jewish businesses or even branch offices must be approved by authorities.

It was stated that the decree is to serve the purpose of registering all Jewish possessions in Germany, especially in Austria.

HUNDREDS BREAK STATE VEHICLE LAW

SALEM, April 27.—(AP)—State police arrested 627 persons in March for violation of motor vehicle laws, sentences and fines for these offenses totaling 2,079 days and \$7,017.

There were 198 arrests for crimes against person and property, sentences and fines aggregating 112 years and \$2,454.

Sixty-four persons, arrested for game code violations, were fined \$1,332, while the eight persons who violated the commercial fisheries code were fined \$420.

UNSOLED APPLES IN OREGON REPORTED

PORTLAND, April 28.—(AP)—C. J. Hansen of the bureau of agricultural economics said today less than 80 carloads of apples remained for marketing in the Hood River and southern Oregon districts.

The eastern weighted auction averages increased from \$1.21 in January to \$1.58 a box in April.

Oregon has already shipped 2337 boxes compared with 2905 for the 1937 season.
