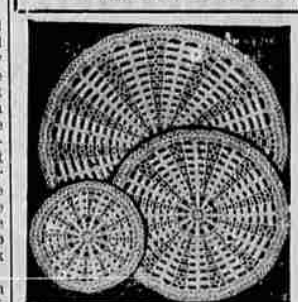
MISSIONARY SOCIETY MEETS AT BARKER HOME
