U. S. APPEAL IN NUT CODE ARGUED

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—(AP)—The government's appeal to set aside an order adverse to the 1935 agricultural adjustment administration came before the ninth circuit court of appeals today, with Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace seeking to void a walnut code exemption granted the Hudson-Duncan Co., Portland, Ore.

The Portland firm was granted exemption from provisions of the walnut code for California, Oregon and Washington by Federal Judge James Algor Fee in Portland, June 10, 1937.

Representing the government today was John W. Aiken, special assistant to the attorney general. Albert W. Gentner, Portland, was counsel for the Hudson-Duncan company.

The firm challenged the constitutionality of the code and asked exemption soon after the AAA issued a regulatory order for the walnut industry Oct. 11, 1935. Elimination of all compulsory clauses of the code was asked.

The AAA, after a hearing, upheld the code's provisions Jan. 3, 1936, after which the case went to federal court in Portland.

BEER TAX MONEY ALLOTTED DOUGLAS

Apportionments of the first quarter privilege tax on beer, collected by the Oregon liquor control commission, to municipalities and counties of the state were announced today. Douglas county's apportionment of the \$27,244.17 allotted is \$386.16. Apportionments

to the county's municipalities are: Canyonville \$4.77, Drain \$14.20, Glendale \$14.74, Myrtle Creek \$11.45, Oakland \$12.03, Reedsport \$33.65, Riddle \$5.57, Roseburg \$124.60, Sutherlin \$13.65, Yoncalla \$7.20. Apportionments are made on a basis of population.

TERMS GIVEN A.F.L. WINDOW SMASHERS

HILLSBORO, April 28.—(AP)—Two former A.F.L. teamsters were sentenced to county jail terms and a third gained a delay in sentence in circuit court today. Ernest Leland Kell and Orville Hart, who pleaded guilty to indictments accusing them of throwing rocks through the windows of a restaurant at Beaverton, received nine-month terms. Ellis Burr Russell, who pleaded guilty to a similar charge, will be sentenced on May 7.

HESS BACKER SAYS MARTIN CAN'T WIN

SALEM, April 28.—(AP)—Elton Watkins, former democratic congressman, told a "Hess for Governor" democratic meeting last night that Governor Charles H. Martin could not be reelected because he had alienated labor groups and failed to support President Roosevelt.

Watkins lauded Henry Hess, La Grande, Martin's opponent, and asserted he had constructive ideas for Oregon's development.

Martin had nothing to do with a recent drive against alleged labor terrorists, Watkins asserted. He declared the action should be credited to the Multnomah county sheriff's office.

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NEW HAMPSHIRE OBSERVES FAST DAY

CONCORD, N. H., April 28.—(AP)—New Hampshire today observed its unique holiday—fast day—first proclaimed 257 years ago.

It is the only New England state to cling to a tradition dating back to 1681, when the aged governor of province lay dying. He ordered a day of public fasting and prayer in view of "sundry tokens of Divine displeasure."

Another proclamation cautioned elders and ministers to keep watch to make certain the public carried out the fasting order.

It urged that the people "seriously wrestle with the Lord that He may turn from the fierceness of His anger and cause His face to shine upon us in all our concerns."

CAN'T SEE F. D. R. 3RD TERM WINNER

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., April 28.—(AP)—Senator Burton K. Wheeler, (D, Mont.), said today "although many people seem to think the president will run for a third term, I can't conceive of any man doing it or winning if he tried."

The importance of a third party in national affairs, he told interviewers, "depends on action taken by the democratic and republican conventions. If both parties nominate stand-pat candidates the third party, by putting up a progressive, would be the determining factor in an election."

He added that he expected President Roosevelt's pump priming recovery program to be enacted "very much as proposed," but he voiced firm opposition to the naval expansion program.
