## RECREATION NEWS

### Douglas County Conditions Summarized in Forestry Service Bulletin.

With an streams in the Umpqua watershed moderately high, fishing prospects are not favorable at this time. However, some fish are being taken on bait, and a few campers already are making use of the improved camp grounds built and maintained by the forest service for the free use of the public.

**Diamond Lake District:** The district is snow-bound to auto traffic, with the opening date of the Union Creek highway to Diamond Lake still indefinite. A snow depth of 10 feet has been reported at Union Creek summit, with 46" at Diamond Lake lodge, and from 1 to 5 feet topping the ice sheet which still covers the lake. The closest present approach to this district is over the North Umpqua road to its end at Dry creek, thence 12 miles of trail to the Big Camas ranger station.

**South Umpqua District:** Roads are in poor condition, and travel is limited to the main highways. With continued good weather some forest roads may be opened this week-end. Last-minute information may be obtained by telephone or personal call to Tiller ranger station.

**North Umpqua District:** The North Umpqua road to Steamboat is in fair condition. Much of the road between Williams creek and Steamboat has been widened during the winter months. The Little River road is in poor condition, although passable. Maintenance work is being done.

**Bohemia District:** Roads have not yet been maintained, and travel is confined to main highways. A slide has blocked the Brice creek road a mile, below Lund park. There is no snow in the vicinity of Layng creek ranger station; and Rujada camp, although still quite damp is open to the public. Streams are not too high for fair bait fishing, and at least one limit catch has been reported.
