RAIL WORKERS FACE 15 PCT. WAGE CUT

tion of 10 per cent on paychecks was accepted voluntarily by the employees.

In the four months ended in January, 1938, the net operating income of class 1 railroads, the statement said, was \$12,710,622, or 10 per cent below that earned in the four months ended in January, 1937.

"Even more significant," the memorandum continued, "is the fact that net railway operating income in January, 1938, fell 38 per cent below that of January, 1937. In this connection it must be remembered that the carriers' 1932 request for wage reduction was prompted by the inadequacy of railway net earnings in the latter part of that year."

The railroad announced they would give formal notice of the reduction to the 21 brotherhoods at once.

A spokesman explained that if the employees refuse to accept the cut, conferences between representatives of the unions and spokesmen for the managements would be called to attempt to negotiate a settlement.

If the negotiations fail, he added, either side could move to submit the controversy to the arbitration board. If the arbitrators fail to bring about a solution, President Roosevelt would be asked to appoint a fact-finding commission.

The spokesman estimated that if the negotiations followed this complete course three or four months would be consumed.

The association represents 142 class 1 railroads.

UNION WON'T ACCEPT CUT. EMPLOYEES HEAD ASSAULTS

CLEVELAND, April 29.—(AP)—D. B. Robertson, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Enginemen, declared today "there will be no wage reduction agreed to by railroad employees."

Robertson said the wage reduction resolution of the Association of American Railroads was "an attempt to embarrass the president in his efforts to bolster recovery." He asserted the wage bill of the railroads has been reduced \$40,000,000 a month since last October.

"We're paying our price right now," the brotherhood leader said, "and if those bondholders who are controlling the railroads will take their losses, we'll be in pretty good shape."

WAGE SLASH OPPOSITION CARRIED TO WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—Opposition of railroad labor to the wage cut proposed by the Association of American Railroads was carried to the white house today by George Harrison, head of the Railway Labor Executives association.

France's reserves, estimated at 7,000,000, and Britain's reserves of men of fighting age, put at 9,000,000, the greatest potential army in the world.

Even greater importance is attached to pooling of navies and airforces, probably under British direction. The navies would total nearly two million tons, built in building.

Both powers are adding feverishly to their airforces, but France now has 1,400 first line planes and 900 in reserve. Britain is known to be working toward an objective much higher than that previously announced—1,750 first line planes by March, 1939.

starving the Czechs and other peoples of the Danubian region into submission.

Previously they had drafted main outlines of plans to link their army, navy and airforce resources against any threat of invasion to either.

The moral force of this combination strengthened their hands as they turned to the question of safeguards against war dangers in central Europe, where Nazi expansion imperils Czechoslovakia, France's ally.

Huge Forces Pooled The combined French and British armies contemplated by the agreement on pooling of defense forces would make 1,250,000 men available immediately on the outbreak of war.

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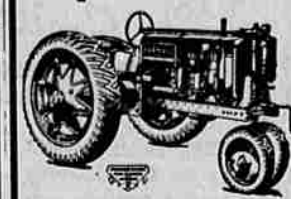
CRAFTS SHOW SET AT JR. HIGH TONIGHT

CASCADE WINTER TAKES DEER TOLL

Deer in the Cascade region of the Umpqua national forest still have not recovered from the hard winter of a year ago, Perry Wright of Cape Hills reported today. Mr. Wright came to Roseburg with pelts of 10 lynx cats and one coyote, which he trapped recently.

During the heavy snows of the winter of 1936-37 many deer died of starvation or were so badly weakened that they were easy prey for predatory animals, Mr. Wright said. Despite the ample feed available during the past winter, the deer are still poor and show the effects of the previous winter, he reports.

There appears, however, to have been a considerable increase in numbers. At least, he reports, more are to be seen in the Illahee district than at the same time last year.

ATTORNEY GENERAL POSITION REFUSED

HARRISBURG, Pa., April 28.—(AP)—Dean Herbert F. Goodrich of the University of Pennsylvania law school turned down today appointment as attorney general of Pennsylvania, succeeding deceased Charles J. Margiotti.

Governor Earle, who fired Margiotti yesterday and named Goodrich after Margiotti declined to discuss openly with Earle evidence to back his charges that state legislator had been "bought," then appointed Public Utility Commissioner Guy K. Bard.

Bard's acceptance came as Margiotti conferred with Dauphin county (Harrisburg) judges and the district attorney on Margiotti's contention for a grand jury probe of his charges. They talked three hours behind closed doors, then recessed and planned to meet again.

Bard announced as his first act an "immediate investigation" into Margiotti's charges that state legislation was "bought and sold."

"I will take any action that the facts command," he said.

POLITICS WARNING GIVEN WPA HEADS

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—Any WPA official who tries to mix relief jobs with political schemes, Administrator Harry L. Hopkins said today, is risking his own pay check.

Hopkins said he soon would send out a "one-syllable" statement to every worker, assuring him that "no man will lose his job because of the way he does or does not vote."

"The American people are not going to stand for relief work to be made a political football," he said. "I'll fire anybody in the WPA who joins in any such attempt, but I can't control politicians who go about claiming they can do this or that about hiring or firing relief workers."
