RIVERSIDE GRANGE BENEFIT CARD PARTY IS ENJOYABLE EVENT

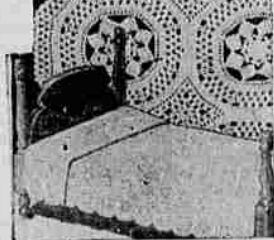
One of a series of delightful benefit five hundred parties, sponsored by the ladies of the Riverside grange, was held Tuesday evening at the grange hall.

Noted Harpist Dated Here By Lutherans



In observance of National Music week, a sacred concert will be given Tuesday, May 3, beginning at 8:00 p. m. at St. Paul's Lutheran church, West Roseburg. Mr. Otto Bagnaz, above, of Fond Du Lac, Wisconsin, one of the leading harpists of the United States, will be the soloist. He will be assisted by his son and daughter on the vibrato harp and marimba.

The harp which Mr. Bagnaz plays is the last word in the harp maker's art, both as to construction and tone, and is termed "the Stradivarius of harps." It was produced for exhibition at the Century of Progress exposition, Chicago, and required two years to build. It is interesting to note that this particular instrument was first

played before the public by Mr. Bagnaz in a symphony concert at Chicago towards the close of the fair.

Mr. Bagnaz' musical career includes a number of seasons as assistant harpist and soloist with some of the country's leading symphony orchestras. Concert tours have taken him into 42 states of the union.

The concert program Tuesday evening will include a number of favorite selections from the classics, together with chorales and hymns of the church, particularly those which are in season at the present time.
