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Go to School to Learn

THIS is an especially apt time to
think a little about what
changes in the times of education
are brought about by heightened
political rivalries, strengthened
economic barriers, intensified inter-
national ill-will, and wars.

Deteriorations and perversions
in educational systems are not ef-
fectively by decree alone. The fac-
ulty mind, the student mind, the ag-
gregate intelligence of the scholas-
tic field, absorb the emotional
colorations of the world at large,
and the characteristics of an en-
tire system become so changed in
time as to make it unrecognizable.
The supposedly cloistered school is
after all not quite hermetically
sealed.

The values of liberal arts courses
in colleges as opposed to speci-
alized training, general courses in
high schools as opposed to techni-
cal courses, are the subject of con-
siderable dispute at present in the
light of their ultimate practical
benefits to the average man. But
that there is a place for both...
that the world needs men of learn-
ing as well as men of training...
is undeniable. Education as an
instrument whereby a man may en-
large the scope of his cultural ex-
perience as a means to attaining
simply a greater degree of pleas-
ure out of life is also still accepted
as one of the assets of a civilized
existence.

The opportunities of this kind of
an education are in especial danger
of being abridged in periods of
widespread international ill-will.
The availability of courses in for-
eign languages, foreign literature,
is particularly subject to destruc-
tion. You may remember the dis-
appearance of high school German
courses 20 years ago.

The courses were not abolished
in some schools, but few students
took them where they remained.
You read now that the popularity
of German rose in New York's
schools after the war, to a post-
war high point in 1934, and then
started going down steadily, and is
still going down.

Language is a cultural asset,
whether nazism is or is not. At
present the chances for German
look as if they're rapidly approach-
ing the vanishing point. Will
Goethe be universally unfathom-
able in this country a few years
from now?

Wouldn't it be dandy for the
English language if the Americans
and British got to despising one
another for a few generations?

DIZZY DEAN PULLS MUSCLE IN ARM

Pitcher Has to Be Yanked
From Mound But Cubs
Win Out Anyway.

When Dizzy Dean started to
pitch yesterday he did some sort
of damage to that expensive pitch-
ing arm. And when you hurt \$250-
000 worth of baseball material and
some very good pennant prospects,
no matter how slightly, that's big
news.

Dizzy maintained it was nothing
serious and he probably could have
remained in there while the Chi-
cago Cubs went on to bat out a
6 to 4 decision over Cincinnati's
Reds. He expects to take his next
regular turn on the mound. Never-
theless he did pull a muscle in his
salary wing in the fourth and Man-
ager Grimm hauled him right out of
the game. There were plenty of
long faces around Chicago when the
news got around.

While Dean was the day's No. 1
headline man, some other major
leagueers who attracted special
notice included Poffenberger and
Dixie Walker, whose efforts gave
the Detroit Tigers a 5-1 decision
over the Chicago White Sox; Pel-
ler and Keltner, the young Clevel-
and athletes who accounted for a
3-2 victory over the St. Louis
Browns; Bill Werber of the Phila-
delphia Athletics; Hasset of the
Brooklyn Dodgers; and those four
Boston Red Sox players who
handed the New York Yankees a
6-4 decision on errors.

Werber pulled off the day's rare-
st individual feat. With the bases
full of Athletics after Washington
had rallied in the ninth to tie the
score, he grabbed a good chance
and stole home with the run that
gave the A's a 7-6 victory.

Peller and Keltner combined to
keep the Indians on top of the
American league, the former by
hurling eight-inning, nine-strikeout
ball at the Browns and the latter
by clouting a homer and single
to account for all three Cleveland
runs. Poffenberger and Walker
pulled a similar two-man stunt.
"Poff" checked the White Sox
with seven blows and Dixie belted
home run with one aboard to
start a four-run winning rally.

The Yankees felt somewhat
brighter after Gehrig got a couple
of hits. Dickey returned to help
the clouting and word came out
that Joe Di Maggio was due back
today. But they won mainly be-
cause four Boston errors gave
them their unexpected runs.
Hasset's only contribution was
to draw a base on balls, but that
came with the corners loaded and
enabled the Dodgers to turn back
the Phillies, 5-4, after twelve
dreary innings.

NEW INDICTMENTS HIT 6 LABORITES

PORTLAND, April 29.—(AP)—The Multnomah county grand jury returned indictments involving six men, one of them Al E. Rosser, former secretary of the local AFL teamsters' union, today in an investigation of labor disorders.

Rosser, already indicted for arson in connection with the destruction of a box factory and lumber yard at West Salem, was accused in four true bills.

He was indicted with James R. Scott, ex-business agent of an AFL warehousemen's local, of placing a stench bomb in the former Kelly's restaurant on January 1, 1936. Another bill charged he placed a stench bomb in a Walgreen drug store on January 1, 1937.

Jack Minsky and William Blackwell, former teamsters, were indicted with Scott and Rosser on a charge of property destruction by explosion at the Red Ball Transfer company. Another charge named Rosser, Scott, Minsky, Roy Cooper and Melvin A. Bozarth on a similar count at the Club cafe.

'GIFT OF GOD' BABY SENTENCES UPHOLD

ST. PAUL, April 30.—(AP)—Conviction of Mrs. Nellie Tipton Muench and two co-defendants of St. Louis, Mo., in the "gift of God" baby case has been affirmed by the United States circuit court of appeals.

The court held that the sentences of Mrs. Muench, her husband, Dr. Ludwig O. Muench, and Wilfred Jones, were within the statutory limits and consequently not excessive, as contended by the defendants, and therefore, not subject to review.

They appealed from convictions on five of nine counts of an indictment charging that the "gift of God" baby case had been affirmed by the United States circuit court of appeals.

The government charged Jones persuaded Miss Anna Ware, a domestic to give up her baby, and took the baby to the Muench home where it was represented as that of Dr. Pitzman to force the victim to part with money and property.

Unofficial British propagandists have been arriving in New York and Washington rather regularly, seeking to build up good will and plugging the idea that the "democratic nations"—meaning England, France and the United States—must stick together in this evil world.

One of the best stories emerging from the series of visits comes from a conversation between Lord Rothermere, the British publisher, and Capt. Joseph M. Patterson, publisher of the New York Daily News.

"A nation which insisted on defending her national honor would not stand for the bombing of the Panay," said Rothermere.

"Just wait until they shoot our ambassador!" replied Patterson.

(The British ambassador to China had been seriously machine-gunned by a Japanese plane.)

Russia Wants Peace
Heated argument developed the other night after dinner at the Russian embassy, between isolationists and "collective security" advocates among a group of American legislators, officials and private citizens who were guests.

Suave popular Ambassador Troyanovsky started it by denouncing American propaganda, saying that he wasn't seeking American aid for Russia, since Russia was almost as isolated as the United States and historically just as hard to attack. But Russia wanted world peace and more international trade, said the ambassador, and collective security would be necessary for an orderly world.

Others took up the refrain and chief champions of isolation were Congressman Maury Maverick of Texas and SEC Commissioner Jerome Frank.

Maverick demanded to know how the United States could afford to get chummy with any European nation—saying that England had been guilty willing to divide Ethiopia, Spain and China with aggressor nations, that France was in bad shape and that no one could tell about Russia because she had killed off so many of her generals and statesmen.

Democracy "Worse Off"
Troyanovsky insisted Russia had only killed her "traitors." But Maverick said there had been too many traitors for comfort and that even though he believed collective security was the only eventual answer, he didn't believe there was any other nation this country could trust.

Frank declared America had gone to war to save democracy once, that now democracy was worse off than ever and that this country should continue aloof from European quarrels.

"Has any American ever worked out a plan for isolation?" asked Sir Wilmont Lewis, brilliant correspondent of the London Times who is sometimes rumored to head up the British intelligence service over here.

"Well," replied Frank, "there was an Englishman named George Washington who had a good plan for isolation and we should have stuck to it."

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ANTI-THIRD TERM LEAGUE ORGANIZED

NEW YORK, April 30.—(AP)—An organization called "the national league to oppose a third term for president" was incorporated this week in New York.

Bennett E. Siegelstein, general counsel, said it was the start of a national movement to limit presidents to a two-term maximum.

The five incorporators of the organization here described themselves as follows:

Daniel L. Crowley, a democrat, president of the Crowley Tar Products company, of New York and Chicago.

Siegelstein, independent democrat, and former assemblyman.

David French, independent democrat, formerly general manager of the Chrysler Motor Car company, manager of fairs at Chicago, Buffalo and in Belgium, and now connected with the New York world's fair.

Edward A. Keeler, of Larchmont, N. Y., republican, one of the owners of the Governor Clinton hotel at Albany.

Wilfred M. Thompson, of Long Beach, L. I., republican.
