SALMON ASCEND BONNEVILLE LADDER

BONNEVILLE, May 2—(AP)—Small preliminary runs of the great Columbia river salmon shimmery in the fishways of Bonneville dam today, testing the ability of the hydro-electric project to afford a passage to native spawning waters.

Major Theron Weaver of the United States army engineers said spotters had counted from 40 to 60 fish breaking water in the 7,000,000 ladders over a two-hour period.

He explained that the high and rolling condition of the river prevented an accurate count and that there were "probably many more" fish than could be seen.

The salmon, forerunners of the big spring migrations, had no difficulty in negotiating the artificial devices, the major said. The peak of the run, abnormally late this year, was expected "within the next few weeks."

The commercial season, a \$10,000,000-a-year industry, opened on the river yesterday. Scores of boats which put out from Astoria had not returned to report opening catches.

The federal project has been criticized by many fish authorities as a threat to the salmon industry's future.
