

CRITIC CALLS ON NLR BOARD TO QUIT JOBS

Effort to Unionize Toolers by "Compulsion" Flayed by Senator Burke of Nebraska.

WASHINGTON, May 2.—(AP)—Senator Burke of Nebraska, one of the administration's severest democratic critics, called today for the resignation of members of the national labor relations board, charging they conceived their duty to use the "compulsory unionization" of American workers.

Burke addressed a meeting of delegates to the annual conference of the United States chamber of commerce.

He asserted new personnel on the labor board would "greatly help" to solve what he termed the "deplorable situation" now existing around the labor relations law. He declared some changes were needed in the law itself, including a declaration of policy that it was intended to be fair to employers as well as to employees and also a provision giving courts concurrent jurisdiction with the labor board over labor questions.

Burke said the labor act had been designed "to promote industrial peace," but that in operation, "it has had exactly the opposite effect."

He cited numerous cases handled by the labor board in which, he said, there was not only discrimination against the employer but also discrimination against groups of workers other than those represented by the committee for industrial organization.

Industry "Strangled"

"A deadly new depression," he said, "that has strangled industry and has deprived millions of responsible American citizens of their jobs has been caused in considerable part by the government-sponsored industrial strife of the past year."

Burke declared "fear of the industrial activities" of the labor board had spread "like a blight over management, workers, and investors of capital."

"The administration of the national labor relations act has been such as to snuff out the fires of industry and send millions of workers into the line of the unemployed," he said.

"The board, he declared, has as its purpose 'to accomplish a national closed shop.'"

"The very fact that at the most, not more than seven, or eight, million workers out of a total of 35 or 40 million have been fit to become dues-paying members of trade unions," Burke said, "is proof conclusive to this federal agency that employers are intimidated and coerced by their employees."

Blind to Facts

"They close their eyes to the truth that among the workers of the nation there is every shade of opinion, from the millions who are staunch union men by conviction and as the result of experience to other millions who are indifferent, and still others who are bitterly opposed to both the theory and the practice of unionism."

"In this democratic nation each program has a right to its own ideas and should be protected in the exercise of that right. To join or not to join should be the free choice of the individual worker. Liberty loving American workmen will not long countenance any other policy."

Cooperation Urged

Another speaker, C. S. Ching, director of industrial and public relations for U. S. Rubber Products, Inc., urged "organized labor and industry" to sit down together to discuss their mutual problems.

"The day has long since passed," Ching said, "when we can consider our employees merely as hired hands, and the day is here when we must consider our employees as part of our organization and look on them exactly the same as we do any other group whom we are endeavoring to impress with the value of our company or our industry."

"If industry persists in its attempt to put handcuffs and leg irons on organized labor, and organized labor goes along with the politicians to put more shackles on industry, some of these days we will both find ourselves where neither one of us can do anything but spit at each other and the politician will stand by and laugh at both of us."

"Isn't it about time that organized labor and industry sat down together to discuss their mutual problems?"

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YANKEES NOSE OUT SENATORS, 2 TO 3

DiMaggio's Second Homer in 2 Days Chief Factor in Team's Triumph.

The Washington Senators gave the New York Yankees a whale of a tussle before going down 3-2 yesterday and they may make trouble for Cleveland when the American league-leading Indians invade the capital today. After the Yanks revised batting order, with Gehrig down in sixth place, had hopped on Dezhong for a 3-0 lead, the Senators started a comeback that drove Pearson to cover and filled the bases in the eighth before Murphy checked the threat.

DiMaggio's second homer in two days was the big Yankee blow, but it was Joe's error, too, that gave the Nats their second run.

Hookie Woodrow Davis was the only Detroit hurler who could check Cleveland yesterday and he didn't come in until a ten-run uprising in the fourth had ruined any faint hope of victory. While Alen held the Detroiters to seven blows, the Indians pounded Wade, Eisenstat and Benton for nine in their one big inning.

Giants Trim Dodgers

The New York Giants, invincible against the eastern clubs of the National league, polished off Brooklyn for the sixth time, 7 to 4, in their last home game before starting west. A combination of six-hit flinging by Melton and homers by Ripple, Lelber and Moore proved too much for the Dodgers.

Cincinnati's Reds, who tackle the champions next, tuned up with their third straight triumph over Pittsburgh, 5 to 0. Two homers by Goodman paced the Reds and, incidentally, gave Goodman the big league lead in four-base swatting.

Cardinals Defeat Cubs

The St. Louis Cardinals, with Medwick leading a typical "gas house" uprising, belted over the Chicago Cubs 6 to 3 while Boston's Red Sox routed the Athletics 13 to 1. In the other big league games the Reds and Phillies and White Sox and Browns took the day off.

After homers, two by Collins and one by Demaree, twice had given the Cubs the lead, the Cards won out with four runs in the eighth, when Medwick hit for the circuit. The Red Soxers got all their runs off Kelley, Smith and Williams in the first three frames while Marcin came through with a seven hit.

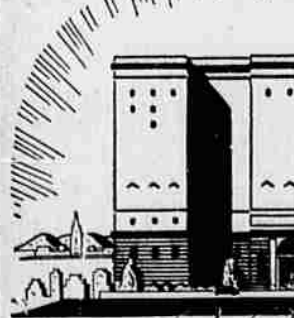

EX-LEGION HURLERS DOING GREAT STUFF

Freddie Hutchinson Talk of Seattle Fans; Mauney Hands Out Blanks.

Two American Legion junior baseball players of two years ago who will be well remembered by baseball fans of Roseburg and vicinity seem to be headed for big time baseball.

Freddie Hutchinson, who almost single handed won the northwest regional championship for Seattle over Portland's El Raza during the 1936 American Legion playoff at the state convention held in Roseburg, is now the sensation of the Pacific Coast league. Playing with the Seattle Indians, who procured him for a cash payment of \$2,500, he is the talk of Seattle fans. He lost one game to the Oaks 2 to 0 and then defeated Sacramento 7 to 1.

In his appearance at Roseburg two years ago he not only pitched Seattle to victory but slammed out one of the longest home runs ever driven out on the local field.

Hutchinson, 18 years old, is six feet, two inches tall and weighs 207 pounds.

Another player well known to local fans and who is attracting considerable attention is Almon "Red" Mauney, the small Eugene pitcher who kept Roseburg juniors badly worried for three years. Mauney recently pitched his second no-hit game in ten days when he blanked Mohawk, 6 to 0, in a Lane county high school B league game while playing with Pleasant Hill High school. The week before he held Oakridge without a hit while winning 9 to 0. Against Mohawk, Mauney struck out 20 of 21 batters in the 7-inning contest.

CONCERT IS DATED AT CAMAS VALLEY

CAMAS VALLEY, May 3.—Wednesday evening, May 4, the Camas Valley orchestra will present a concert in the gymnasium of the school. Included on the program will also be numbers by the harmonica band, violin ensemble, primary chorus and upper grade chorus.

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ECONOMY CITED IN PROMISED NEW CAR

NEW YORK, May 3.—(AP)—The World-Telegram says Emile E. C. Mathis, French motor manufacturer, today confirmed reports that he and Alex Wenner-Wren, Swedish industrialist, were planning a new type of automobile powered by a radical motor in the rear and designed to sell for \$500 or less.

Tentative plans call for manufacture of the car in France, England, Sweden and the United States, with the American plant to be located near New York. Mathis said the car was designed to go 50 to 60 miles on a gallon of gasoline, and that the motor would have seven, eight or nine cylinders. Maximum speed, he said, would be about 50 miles per hour.
