## A.F.L. BACKS FORCE PLAN ON WAGE BILL

WASHINGTON, May 3.—(AP)—House proponents of wage-hour legislation claimed the full support of the American Federation of Labor today for a move to force the measure to the house floor for action in this session. Representative Henley (D-Mark), chairman of an unofficial steering committee supporting the bill, declared that William Green, federation president, had agreed "unequivocally" to do "all in his power" to force a vote on the bill.

Henley said he interpreted that Green's statement meant, in part, the federation would request every member of the house to sign a petition to bring the measure to the floor. The drive for a petition was started after the house rules committee refused to give the bill the right-of-way.

Henley is expected to try to enlist the active support of John L. Lewis and his CIO, in the effort to get the necessary 218 signatures on a house petition as quickly as possible.

## BANDON TAX SUIT FILED BY MAYOR

COQUILLE, May 3.—(AP)—Mayor Ed Capra of Bandon filed a friendly suit in the circuit court yesterday to test the legality of the 1937 legislative act cancelling delinquent taxes on Bandon property for 1936 and prior years.

A forest fire destroyed the community in the fall of 1936.

The county court, city, school district and port commission decided to void the taxes but the county instructed the sheriff not to obey the order until after it had been tested. The lower Capra of the county, will appeal to the state supreme court.
